## THREE DAYS OF FANCY FOWLS, FOLKLIFE ARTISTS AND LIVE MUSIC

Organizers for the Alabama Chicken and Egg Festival (ACEF) recently announced dates, entertainment and activities for North Alabama's wildly popular spring festival. Set for April 12-14, the Alabama Chicken & Egg Festival returns to Moulton for the ninth year, bringing with it a Top 20 Event in the Southeast recognition and three days of family fun centered on agriculture and arts.

"This marks the ninth year for what has become one of the top events in the South," said Vicki Morese, ACEF event coordinator. "Where else can you hear over a dozen bands, learn about chickens and farm life, and participate in family-friendly activities centered on arts and agriculture with only a \$5 daily admission tag?"

Last year, the ACEF spread its wings and expanded to a three-day event, adding a sanctioned poultry show and attracting over 18,000 visitors and hundreds of exotic chickens to the town of Moulton. Hundreds of fancy fowls from across the United States are expected to take part in the poultry show where a Grand Champion title is on the line. Sanctioned by the American Poultry Association (APA) and the American Bantam Association (ABA) and sponsored by Cackle Hatchery from Missouri, the ACEF Poultry Show is open to all Bantam and large fowl. The Poultry Show will take place on all three days in the A.W. Todd Coliseum at the Lions Club Fairgrounds.

Just like chickens, music is a key ingredient in the festival's popularity. Three stages will boast live music ranging from some of Moulton's favorites to the sounds of Muscle Shoals. Previous festivals have featured a wide range of musical talent, but most of the artists performing at the 2013 festival are from, or have connections to, Muscle Shoals. "Serious music fans from all over the world have always known about the Muscle Shoals sound," said Morese.

"With the resurgence of music coming from this area, we felt it is important to highlight local artists who are earning a name for themselves while placing northern Alabama on the entertainment

### Risk Management: AADA Can Help!

The Alabama Agriculture Development



Authority (AADA), housed at the Department of Agriculture & Industries, desires to work with credit worthy Alabama farmers and ranchers to incorporate on farm investments that will, in the long, run serve to minimize risk and maximize profit potential. To assist in that effort, AADA continues to make available low cost funds based on individual needs.

Cattle Hay Barn loans have been available for several years with loans being made to cattlemen across the state. Storing hay under roof verses letting it sit outside next to a fence row is a great example of AADA recognizing a need to work with cattlemen to adopt positive change. Alabama cattlemen have indicated a potential 25-30 percent loss in hay value when the hay rolls were not under roof. Loans up to \$22,500 are available for these sheds. Applications for Hay Barn Loans are available via AADA.

Next, AADA is now trying to help jump start irrigated

farming for individuals that desire to strip a good bit of climate risk out of their row crop farming activities. Irrigation is not for everyone — it requires top notch production skills due to increased costs, a keen knowledge of how to best manage water use and expanded marketing knowledge since yields will likely double or triple.

But, remember, source of water and water volume are huge issues no matter what type irrigation system is being considered. Given the current economic environment, pecan orchards, and most any commercial fruit and vegetable activities, also can dramatically benefit from irrigation technology. AADA's personnel and low cost funding can help you reap the benefits of irrigation.

## ALABAMA DAIRY FARMER NAMED WINNER OF FACES OF FARMING & RANCHING PROGRAM

A dairy farmer from Alabama has been selected as a national spokesperson for the U.S. Farmers & Ranchers Alliance (USFRA).

Will Gilmer, of Lamar County, was one of four farmers selected in USFRA's Faces of Farming & Ranching program, a nationwide search launched by USFRA in June 2012 as a way to identify farmers and ranchers who are proud of what they do and eager to share their stories.

Gilmer and three other program winners were selected from a pool of more than 100 farmer and rancher applicants from across the country. As one of the Faces of Farming & Ranching, Gilmer will share his stories and experiences on a national stage to help answer consumers' questions about how food is grown and raised to feed our nation.

"By adapting advanced management practices, we are able to raise healthy, comfortable cows that produce quality milk and dairy beef," Gilmer said. "I want to help

consumers see that farmers and ranchers have a genuine passion for what they do and take pride in the quality of the food they produce, hoping that it makes a positive contribution to society."

Gilmer and his father own and operate a dairy farm, which has been in continuous operation since Gilmer's grandfather established it in the early 1950s. They currently milk 200 Holstein cows and raise their own replacement heifers, while managing 600 acres of land used for pasture and forage production. Those forages include hay, summer silage crops and small grains/ryegrass for both silage and strip grazing.

Gilmer serves as chairman of the Alabama Dairy Committee, a division of the Alabama Farmers Federation. He is a social media sensation in the farming community with YouTube videos like "Have a Dairy, Merry Christmas" and "MooTube Minutes." Farmers like Will were named winners of this program because they are eager to share their stories about the innovative ways they

continue to improve food production each day. They have the first-hand experience to address complicated issues surrounding food production by giving honest answers about what happens on today's farm and ranches."

# INVASIVE PLANTS OF ALABAMA: AN UNFORGIVING ENEMY

Like many other states, Alabama's woodlands and waterways have been under siege for years by an unforgiving enemy that has an endless battalion of ominous allies. If that statement makes you concerned, it should. There are more than 50 species of invasive plants that have been documented in Alabama, some of which have the potential to forever change Alabama's landscapes. Only in recent years have the significant negative impacts been recognized by those outside the scientific field.

A nonnative plant is one that has most likely been introduced by humans, either deliberately or accidentally, and is a species living outside its native range. An invasive is an introduced nonnative that becomes a pest in its new location and is likely to cause economic or environmental damages. Introductions have

occurred through things such as erosion control plantings, ornamental propagations, and by seeds and plants on shipping containers. In many cases, once established, invasives become very difficult to extirpate and are typically associated with a high cost, both financially and ecologically. Examples of some invasive plants include kudzu, Chinese privet, cogongrass, multiflora rose and tallowtree.

The proliferation of nonnative invasive plants can have serious repercussions if left uncontrolled. They can negatively impact forest and agriculture production, resulting in significant economic losses; be poisonous to livestock; limit access to areas on land and water; and displace native plants resulting in decreased native floral and faunal diversity. In fact, nonnative species are considered a responsible factor in the decline of many threatened and endangered species by altering habitats, second only to habitat loss.

While some nonnatives

perform poorly in their new environment, others can establish themselves very quickly and propagate. Many of these new environments are free of inhibiting factors that were present in their native area, such as pathogens, predators, parasites and other plant competitors. These factors, which kept their numbers in check, are now not present to limit their spread. Without any natural inhibitors, these plants are able to propagate and disperse to unmanageable levels at times.

In order to control the spread of nonnative invasives, it is up to landowners and land managers to take the reins and make proactive efforts. There are many sources of information concerning the identification and recommended control practices of harmful invasives including the Internet, agencies such as the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Alabama Forestry Commission, the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources,

the Alabama Cooperative Extension System and universities. Private citizens also can assist by joining proactive groups, such as the Alabama Invasive Plant Council, to become better educated about invasive plants and to disseminate this information to others.

# FARMERS SHOULD UTILIZE 2013 CROP PROGRAM EXTENSIONS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers to utilize commodity, disaster and conservation programs extended by the reauthorization of the 2008 farm bill. Extended programs include the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP, the Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE), and the Milk Income Loss Contract Program (MILC).

House Agriculture Committee Chairman Frank Lucas (R-Okla.) said this opportunity affords farmers a sense of security when planning this year's crops. "It is vitally important our farmers know Congress and the administration intend to keep the commitment made with the one-year extension of the 2008 farm bill," Lucas said. "Looking ahead, it is equally important that our farmers and ranchers be able to plan for the long term. My goal remains to [complete a five-year comprehensive farm bill] and ensure our investment in American agriculture."

Regarding 2013 crops, FSA will begin sign-ups for DCP and ACRE Feb. 19. The DCP sign-up period ends Aug. 2 and the ACRE sign-up period ends June 3. Eligible participants may choose which program to enroll in, as selections are not based on the previous year. All dairy producers' MILC contracts are automatically extended to Sept. 30. Eligible producers do not need to re-enroll.

# SBA INJURY DISASTER LOANS DUE TO DROUGHT

The U.S. Small Business Administration announced that federal economic injury disaster loans are available to small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private non-profit organizations of all sizes located in Barbour, Chambers, Cherokee, Cleburne, Henry, Houston, Lee, Randolph and Russell counties in Alabama as a result of the drought beginning Dec. 15, 2012.

Under this declaration, the SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program is available to eligible farm-related and nonfarm-related entities that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. With the exception of aquaculture enterprises, SBA can't provide disaster loans to agricultural producers, farmers or ranchers. Nurseries are eligible to apply for economic injury disaster loans for losses caused by drought conditions.

The loan amount can be up

to \$2 million with interest rates of 2.875 percent for private non-profit organizations of all sizes and 4 percent for small businesses, with terms up to 30 years. The SBA determines eligibility based on the size of the applicant, type of activity and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition. These working capital loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that could have been paid had the disaster not occurred. The loans are not intended to replace lost sales or profits.

# WILDLIFE CONSERVATION RETROSPECTIVE

On the arrival of a New Year, a glimpse of the past brings appreciation of the wildlife abundance of the present day, a product of public policy unique in its model of self-supported funding. This user-funded model, based on hunting and fishing licenses, continues to pay for wildlife conservation today.

According to Mark Duda, of Virginia-based Responsive Management, "The vast fish and wildlife resources that Americans enjoy are not here by chance. The conservation and sportsmen communities supported the imposition of an excise tax on firearms and ammunition that, along with the dedicated revenue from hunting and fishing licenses, would be used exclusively by state wildlife agencies to professionally manage wildlife populations."

An article published in the June 1933 Alabama Game and Fish News offered a quarter-century perspective on the early beginnings of the license-based funding model. In the article, titled "Department Founded on Faith in Future," Judge Charles E. McCall wrote:

"When the Legislature of Alabama assembled in 1907, Gov. W. D. Jelks, in his message to that body, recommended the passage of a comprehensive Game and Fish law. He stated that no real protection could be secured short of a provision arranging for game wardens and that the law should be broad enough to embrace in its protective features other birds than game

birds, and to prevent the extinction of game, as well as the songbirds of the State.

"Henry B. Steagall was the author of the bill installing the State Game and Fisheries Department,


creating the office of the State Commissioner of Game and Fisheries, providing for employment of game wardens, and creating a fund known as the Game and Fish Protective Fund.

"The Steagall Bill became a law on its approval by the Governor on Feb. 19, 1907. The Act provided that the salary and all expenses of the Department were to be paid from the Game and Fish Protective Fund and expenditures were limited to the receipts of that fund. ...

"It began with nothing—provisions not even being made for postage. Founded on faith and an unshaken belief in the possibilities of future accomplishments, it began its steady travel toward its present achievements."

"If only Judge McCall had known the truth of his words about the possibilities of future accomplishments," said Corky Pugh, executive director of the Hunting Heritage Foundation.

The user-funded model established by states for hunters and anglers to pay for protection of fish and wildlife resources was expanded by Congress in 1937 with the passage



of the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act, which allocates 3-to-1 matching monies derived from federal excise taxes paid at the manufacturers' level on hunting arms and ammunition to state wildlife agencies.

Again in 1950, Congress further expanded the funding model with the passage of the Dingell-Johnson Sportfish Restoration Act, which allocates similar matching monies collected from manufacturers of fishing tackle to the states for fisheries work. The 1984 Wallop-Breaux Act expanded Sportfish Restoration funding to include federal motorboat fuel tax.

"Every hunting license or fishing license purchased is important in helping to pay for management and protection of fish and wildlife resources," said Pugh. "There are no general tax dollars that pay for the work of the Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division in Alabama."

## SALES TAX HOLIDAY FOR SEVERE WEATHER PREPAREDNESS

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. (CST) on Friday, February 22, and ending at midnight on Sunday, February 24, Alabama will hold its second annual sales tax holiday, giving shoppers the opportunity to purchase certain severe-weather preparedness supplies free of state sales or use tax.

A provision in the Severe Weather Preparedness Sales Tax Holiday law allows counties and municipalities to join the state by removing their own local sales and use taxes from the same items during the same weekend (Reference: Act 2012-256).

The Alabama Department of Revenue has compiled a listing of all cities and counties participating in the 2013 Severe Weather Preparedness

Tax Holiday. The city and county listing is available at <http://www.revenue.alabama.gov/salestax/WPSalesTaxHoliday.htm> and provides guidance to both retailers and consumers.

The following list contains examples of items covered under the Severe Weather Preparedness holiday.

Items below that have a sales price of \$60 or less per item:

- Batteries: AAA-cell batteries, AA-cell batteries, C-cell batteries, D-cell batteries, 6-volt batteries, 9-volt batteries. (NOTE: coin batteries, automobile batteries, and boat batteries are not exempt.)
- Cellular phone battery & charger

- Portable self-powered or battery-powered radio, two-way radio, weather-band radio or NOAA weather radio
- Portable self-powered light source, including battery-powered flashlights, lanterns, or emergency glow sticks
- Tarpaulin, plastic sheeting, plastic drop cloths, and other flexible, waterproof sheeting
- Ground anchor system, such as bungee cords or rope, or tie-down kits
- Duct tape
- Plywood, window film or other materials specifically designed to protect window coverings
- Non-electric food storage cooler or water storage container

- Non-electric can opener
  - Artificial ice, blue ice, ice packs, reusable ice
  - Self-contained first aid kit
  - Fire extinguisher
  - Smoke detector & carbon monoxide detector
  - Gas or diesel fuel tank or container
- Items below that have a sales price of \$1,000 or less:
- Portable generators and power cords

## SBA DISASTER ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

Residents and businesses in Alabama affected by severe storms and flooding on Dec. 25-26 can apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration.

The disaster declaration covers Mobile and Pike counties and the adjacent counties of Baldwin, Barbour, Bullock, Coffee, Crenshaw, Dale, Montgomery and Washington in Alabama and George, Green and Jackson counties in Mississippi.

"Loans up to \$200,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for loans up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property," said Frank Skaggs, director of SBA's Field Operations Center East in Atlanta, Ga.

SBA's Alabama District Director Tom Todt said, "Businesses and non-profit organizations of any size may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets."

For small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small aquaculture businesses and most private non-profit organizations of all sizes, the SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. EIDL assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any physical property damage.
