## Alabama Pine Straw Association

Last month, Commissioner John McMillan visited with the Alabama Pine Straw Association centered in Opelika and met Leh Bass. The association is working to make the pine straw industry in Alabama number one in the nation. APSA connects pine forest owners to producers, and producers to marketers. The association also works to train harvesters to achieve optimum pine straw production. The goal of the association is to create wholesale and retail markets to generate maximum income for landowners.

While it may seem unorthodox, the pine straw

## BEETS: A PROFITABLE BIOFUEL ALTERNATIVE

A spring harvest of a winter crop in Baldwin County at Woerner AgriBusiness' farm near Foley turned more than a few heads during a demonstration tour in early May.

Dozens of farmers, bankers and investment group representatives took turns walking beside the German-made Grimme Rootster as it harvested row upon row of energy beets, each weighing at least 10 pounds. Stainless steel wheels gently lifted individual beets from the ground and dumped them onto a wide-cross roller table.

Cleaning turbines then roll the beets to remove remnant

soil as they're conveyed upward and into an onboard collection bin.

The farmers expressed their amazement at how efficient everything was and how quickly the bin filled with beets across a relatively short run up a single row.

An incredible yield per acre, combined with the market potential for multiple uses of the beets' distilled sugar content, are what pioneers of Woerner's self-funded program hope to take to the bank to build an agriculture-based industry in Baldwin County within the next couple of years.

This entire operation is

the brainchild of George Woerner. His family's Woerner AgriBusiness division has been involved in a five-year pilot project to determine if the beets could be grown in Alabama's warm climate with a marketable tonnage per acre. Woerner explained that he and his partners are "getting to the point of making some hard decisions" as to how far they will go to see the operation, requiring significant investment, become a reality.

Key to their success is convincing other Baldwin County farmers to grow the beets on their land. It will take harvests from as many as 10,000

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# SEWELL PROMOTES STRIKEFORCE INITIATIVE IN ALABAMA

Congresswoman Terri Sewell, 7<sup>th</sup> Congressional District, joined U.S. Department of Agriculture agency leaders and others at a meeting of the StrikeForce for Rural Growth and Opportunity in Alabama.

Over 90 people around the state participated in the event held at the Central Alabama

Farmers Cooperative in Selma in early May.

Currently, 90 percent of the nation's persistent poverty counties are in rural America. The primary goal of the StrikeForce Initiative is to partner with local and state governments and community organizations on projects that promote economic

development and job creation.

USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack started the StrikeForce Initiative as a pilot project in 2010 in selected regions of three states: Arkansas, Georgia and Mississippi. In 2011, it was expanded to include Colorado, New Mexico and Nevada. In 2013, Vilsack announced new efforts to bring the StrikeForce for Rural Growth and Opportunity to Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Utah and Virginia.

Sewell said that her office is proud to be a partner in the initiative to help elevate poverty. She encouraged everyone to use the resources available to help in the 23 persistent poverty counties in the StrikeForce Initiative. Eleven of those counties are in her district.

"We want the success of your organizations to really reflect on the success of our state and this district," Sewell said. "What I love about the

StrikeForce Initiative is its primary focus is leveraging public-private dollars, which gives us a lot of opportunities to seek grants for public-private land, conservation, and many different sectors."

Dr. Tammy Gray-Steele, executive director of the Oklahoma-based National Women in Ag Association, spoke to the group about the importance of partnering with agricultural and community-based groups to provide vital opportunities for rural and urban communities. She said it was important to make investments within communities to help move toward an authentic and sustainable future.

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
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## ECONOMIC IMPACTS OF AGRICULTURE, FORESTRY & RELATED INDUSTRIES

Alabama's agriculture, forestry and related industries had a total output and employment impact of \$70.4 billion and 580,295 jobs, according to a recent report by the Auburn University Department of Agriculture Economics and Rural Sociology and the University

of Florida Center for Economic Impact Analysis, in conjunction with the Alabama Agribusiness Council and Alabama Cooperative Extension System.

The economic impact study reported that on average, one of out every 4.6 jobs in Alabama is related to agriculture and forestry, accounting for the second largest number of jobs in the state.

In 2010, the farm gate sales of agricultural commodities totaled \$4.7 billion (figure 1), which included \$3.8 billion for livestock and poultry and \$918.3 million for crops.

Agricultural production sales included the following:

- \$3.1 billion for poultry and eggs
- \$394.5 million for cattle

## DAIRY INDUSTRY FOCUSES ON ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

Dairy farmers and representatives from the dairy industry recently made a trip to Washington, D.C. to meet with key individuals who have an impact on the industry's future.

At the core of these meetings were the dairy

industry's continued efforts on stewardship, conservation and sustainability work.

The Innovation Center for U.S. Dairy and the U.S. Department of Agriculture have signed a memorandum of understanding that renews a partnership that has been

bringing benefits to dairy farmers. In the first three years of the partnership, thousands of dairy producers were able to make progress towards their conservation and sustainability goals. Because of this success, the memorandum was

renewed, continuing the collaborative research of these sustainability efforts.

The goal of this partnership is to advance research and projects that improve the economics of sustainability, support innovation opportunities and provide dairy farms and companies access to funding that helps them continuously improve their environmental stewardship and sustainability.

Among the resources being provided by this partnership is the U.S. Dairy's Environmental Footprint, a quick reference guide that provides information explaining the journey of a gallon of milk from the beginning of its life cycle through the end of its processing and finally its purchase and consumption by the consumer. This report also provides information on dairy's contribution to the health and nutrition in the global food system.

Another resource is Farm Smart, an online tool that uses farm-specific data combined with scientific analysis to help the dairy producer forecast the outcomes of different

management practices they are considering for their facility or field.

The partnership also has provided energy audits and cost share grants for energy efficiency equipment implementation at dairy operations, as well as funding for conservation practices that improve the sustainability of the dairy farmers' working lands.

These resources described above are just a few examples of the research being done under the partnership.

In addition to the meetings, winners of the second annual U.S. Dairy Sustainability Awards were announced. This program recognizes dairy farms and businesses of all types for practices that advance the industry's commitment to healthy products, healthy communities and a healthy planet, while claiming dairy's environmental stewardship heritage and telling its story and values to its consumers.

industry can actually be quite lucrative. It is a natural, renewable source of income for many pine forest owners. Longleaf pine is the most profitable pine, and can produce up to \$200 per acre per year, because it is more durable and more scarce. Loblolly pine straw also is abundant in Alabama, and can produce up to \$100 per acre per year. Start-up costs for pine straw harvesting are very low for already established pine forests. A three-man raking crew can make 1,200-1,500 bales of pine straw per week. This can lead to annual earnings of up to \$75,000 for harvesters.

Other than economic benefits, there are several reasons many foresters are becoming interested in the pine straw industry. Benefits for landowners through the APSA include trained producers to assure all of their straw is being put to maximum use, written contracts and competitive bids to assure they are receiving the best service possible, payment before harvest, removal of the fuel hazard from the forest floor, removal of invasive vegetation, vegetation control, and the aesthetic aspect of a clean forest floor. Producers benefit from access to managed, high production areas, local markets, and

quality control. Marketers benefit by being able to buy local, quality controlled pine straw that is free of invasive plants.

Pine straw is used primarily in landscaping as a type of mulch. Pine straw mulch is ideal for hills or slopes because the needles interlock and prevent the straw from moving. It also protects from cold weather and controls weeds. Most pine straw has an acid level similar to that of rainwater, making it perfect for most plants. It generally only has to be applied once annually, making it very low maintenance. Pine straw is practical, and makes for a nice looking, weed free flowerbed.

"I was very impressed with Leh Bass and the Alabama

Pine Straw Association and look forward to seeing them succeed in their mission. Hopefully this will bring about a new, prosperous industry for the state of Alabama," said McMillan.

# NASS AGRICULTURAL SURVEY RESULTS PENDING

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agriculture Statistics Service (NASS) is conducting the June Agricultural Survey to estimate production and supply levels for 2013.

NASS publishes the findings in the annual *Acreage* report, and the quarterly *Grain Stocks* report, both of which will be released on June 28. Survey data contribute to NASS's annual and monthly *Crop Production* reports, as well as the annual *Small Grains Summary* and USDA's monthly *World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates*.

In May, NASS mailed the June Agricultural Survey questionnaires to farmers in all states except Hawaii, contacting approximately 70,000 farms selected from among the nation's 2.2 million farms. Which commodities the survey asks about vary from state to state, but in all

cases, the survey asks farmers how many acres they planted and intend to harvest of the particular commodities and how much grain and oilseed they store on the farm.

Producers who receive the survey should respond either online at [www.agcounts.usda.gov](http://www.agcounts.usda.gov) or by mail or fax. A NASS representative will contact producers who do not respond to conduct a telephone interview.

All sectors of the agriculture industry rely on NASS to produce timely, accurate, and useful acreage, production and stocks estimates. For example:

Producers use the information to make critical decisions for their operations and to finalize their cropping and marketing plans.

Agribusinesses use the information to evaluate domestic and export sales potential and international

customers look to the data for assurance that the United States will continue to be a reliable supplier of major commodities.

Universities, extension agents, private and government economists, the farm media, and others use the data to identify and analyze emerging issues and trends, such as growth in biotech acres.

The information provided by survey respondents is confidential by federal law. NASS safeguards the privacy of all responses and publishes data only in aggregate form, ensuring that no individual operation or producer can be identified.

acres of beets per year to feed the multi-purpose manufacturing plant, the cost of which Woerner estimates at \$30 million for a plant capable of processing 3,000 tons of beets daily.

The manufacturing plant is the missing link in the plan, say some Baldwin County farmers.

"It shows a lot of potential," said William Griffiths, who farms 1,500 acres in the county. "It looks like they've cleared the first hurdle in determining that the beets will grow here and they can get good yields. It all comes down to do we have some place to take it? A farmer is going to grow anything that's profitable, he just needs a place to take it."

In order for any such manufacturing plant to be viable, Griffiths also noted that there has to be a reliable market for what it produces. Other alternative biofuel sources, such as switch grass, barley and sugar cane among others, held the promise of being the next big thing have failed for various reasons, he said.

Woerner said, since ethanol is not even the most valuable use for energy beet byproducts, an industry built around them is less vulnerable if any single market unexpectedly slows or evaporates.

If the value of products made from the carbohydrate stream produced from beets were used to build a pyramid, Woerner said ethanol would be at the bottom, followed in ascending order by sweeteners, pharmaceuticals ketones, polymers (plastics) and cosmetics at the top.

Woerner has delivered the first load of beets to partner Jim Eddins' Perdido Vineyards, where work on a 2,000-square-foot, pot-still facility was still underway.

Beets will be crushed into the consistency of applesauce before the mash is fed into the still. Eddins expects to be able to process about 60 tons of beets per day, resulting in production of close to 700 gallons of ethanol.

Woerner has several potential markets for this first product, but if they don't pan out, he'll pay the taxes on it, have it blended with gasoline, and then use it to fuel his farm vehicles.



## DON'T LOSE PART OF THIS YEAR'S CROP

2+2=4. This is the way it is supposed to work, but as is the case with far too many commercial vegetable operations around Alabama, vegetables grown without adequate cold storage immediately after picking adds up to about 2½ instead of 4.

With the use of plasticulture and drip tape, yields can easily triple or quadruple; hence larger amounts of produce need to be kept chilled during the time of picking to date of sale, which may be a couple of days or a few hours. Proper handling to hold quality is always a big issue.

Alabama Agricultural Development Authority loan programs can help with this cold storage issue or, for that matter, drip irrigation too. AADA has the expertise, money and knowledge to make this whole process happen. - ½ teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- ½ teaspoon salt

- 1/8 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 3 tablespoons sliced green onion
- ½ cup thinly sliced carrots
- 1½ cups (4 ounces) sliced mushrooms
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves, grilled and sliced
- 2 tablespoons bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Spray a 13x9-inch baking dish with nonstick cooking spray; set aside. Cook and drain pasta according to package directions; keep hot.

Melt butter in a large saucepan over medium heat. Stir in flour and cook 2 minutes, stirring frequently. Whisk in milk, mustard, hot pepper sauce, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper. Cook, stirring constantly, about 10 minutes or until sauce thickens. Stir in onion, carrot, mushrooms and Cheddar until cheese is melted. Remove sauce from heat.

Mix pasta into sauce and pour into prepared pan. Arrange sliced grilled chicken over pasta. Mix bread crumbs and parsley together and sprinkle over pasta.

Bake about 25 minutes or until pasta is heated through and edges are bubbling.

Yield: 1½ cups, per serving

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


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
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
