In 1974, he was elected to the Alabama Senate, where he served two terms. He served as Alabama Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries from

1983-1991. In 1991, he served as state director of Alabama's USDA Farm Service Agency.

He is survived by his wife, Shirley Shields McDonald; son, Mark Russell McDonald; daughters, Caroline McDonald Aderholt and Leah McDonald Engler; and 14 grandchildren.

5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.
6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.
7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. The e-mail address is afcb@agi.alabama.gov and the fax number is 334/240-7169.
9. Ads which are to be repeated must be submitted for each issue.

APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR USDA ORGANIC COST SHARE PROGRAM

Growers and handlers of organic agricultural products now can recover part of the cost of their USDA certification.

The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries (ADAI) will be allocated \$17,000 to reimburse producers and handlers who either obtain or renew their organic certification in the federal fiscal year that ends September 30, 2014. The reimbursement covers 75 percent of certification costs, up to a maximum of \$750.

The Organic Certification Cost Share Programs consist of two programs authorized by separate pieces of legislation: the National Organic Certification Cost Share Program (NOCCSP) and Agricultural Management Assistance Organic Certification Cost Share Program.

“We encourage organic producers to participate in this program and hope that it will help them recoup some of the expenses associated with becoming a USDA certified organic operation,” Alabama Department

of Agriculture and Industries Commissioner John McMillan said.

ADAI will administer the noncompetitive grant program by processing applications for cost share funds, and USDA will reimburse them. USDA distributes funds on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted. Organic operators typically submit a one-page application form, a W-9 Tax Form, proof of certification, an itemized invoice of certification expenses and proof of E-Verify to ADAI.

All farmers, ranchers and handlers who have received organic certification or a renewal of certification from an accredited certifying agent between October 1, 2013 and September 30, 2014 are eligible to participate. Farms transitioning to organic production are not eligible.

PRODUCT SPOTLIGHT

Back in 1923, Mose Lischkoff and Frank Mosher had a deceptively simple idea — an idea that grew over the past 80-plus years from two men and a sack of potatoes into more than 1,200 employees and 100 million pounds of potatoes a year. For it was Lischkoff and Mosher whose fresh, kettle-cooked potato chips formed the foundation of the snack food company known today as Golden Flake.

From Magic City Foods, a tiny basement operation, the company grew quickly. In fact, before the curtain closed on 1923, Lischkoff and Mosher had added two salesmen to meet the public demand for Magic City peanuts, peanut butter crackers, horseradish and its delicious potato chips. Birmingham, for which the company was named, took a definite liking to the snack foods. And the company developed a reputation for service that became legendary.

Then, there was the “Golden Flake Girl,” Helen Friedman, an early employee who played a pivotal role in the expansion of Magic City Food Products. Friedman became an owner when she and her mother bought out Lischkoff. Then in

1928, Friedman married Mosher. While the marriage did not last, Friedman’s association with the company was to endure,



because upon her divorce, she received the entire company in the property settlement. Under Friedman’s dynamic leadership, Magic City Food Products reached sales of nearly \$1 million — making it an attractive acquisition for the Bashinsky family, who bought the company in 1946.

In 1956, the company sold again to Sloan Bashinsky, who bought the company from his father and uncle. The younger Bashinsky brought with him a hands-on knowledge of the business for, although he was a charter member of the board of directors, he had worked his way up to the top job through route sales and production. One of his first moves was to change the name to the more descriptive moniker “Golden Flake Inc.” And it was Sloan Bashinsky who initiated the construction of the 50-acre Birmingham corporate headquarters and extensive manufacturing facility.

Golden Flake went public in 1968. Diversifying into insurance, real estate, fasteners and advertising, in 1977 Golden Flake Snack Foods became a wholly owned subsidiary of Golden Enterprises Inc. Today, the company serves a 12-state market with an extensive product line. For more information on the tasty products the company offers, visit www.goldenflake.com.



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CAUSE OF DIE-OFF AT DEER BREEDING FACILITY DETERMINED

The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries (ADAI), cooperating with the USDA Reference Lab in Iowa, has confirmed that Malignant Catarrhal Fever (MCF), also known as ovine herpesvirus-2 (OvHV-2), caused a recent die-off at a licensed deer-breeding facility in North Alabama. MCF is a potentially fatal viral disease of cloven-hoofed (even-hoofed) animals, such as cattle, deer and pigs.

Since the outbreak began in May, the die-off was contained to the breeding facility, and now that the cause of death is known, all preventative measures to stop the virus from spreading to the remainder of the whitetail herd have been taken.

Domesticated sheep that were not symptomatic, housed in a pen adjacent to the deer, initially had the virus that spread

to the deer. Herpes viruses are widely distributed in nature, and long-lived infections can occur in multiple animal species. The herpes virus associated with sheep is called ovine herpesvirus-2 (OvHV-2). OvHV-2 is the predominant cause of MCF outside of Africa and is a cause of disease in domesticated animals and whitetail deer in the United States. Often domestic sheep are infected with the OvHV-2 virus; however, these sheep are usually clinically normal.

MCF poses no threat to humans, pets or any other domesticated livestock. According to State Veterinarian Dr. Tony Frazier, "This isolated incident reminds producers how important it is to have strict bio-security measures in place. Diseases like MCF that are asymptomatic in domestic animals can be devastating to native wild animals."



Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries John McMillan said, "This case shows how critical the working relationship is between our agency and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR). The cause of the die-off was concluded, and both agencies assisted the facility owner with determining the best course of action."

The facility passed a routine herd inspection earlier this year as part of a joint monitoring program between the DCNR's Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries and ADAI.

Mama's Recipes

August is National Catfish Month. Most of us know how to fry catfish, so we went out looking for a recipe that used catfish in a different way. We found several recipes to choose from on the U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish website, at <http://uscatfish.com/recipes>. Here is one of our favorites from the website.

Catfish Bisque

Ingredients:

- 2 U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish Fillets
- Paprika
- ¼ cup butter
- 1 cup mushrooms, sliced
- ¼ cup green onions, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1½ cups chicken broth
- ½ cup dry white wine (may substitute chicken broth)
- 1 tablespoon fresh parsley, chopped (or 1 teaspoon dried parsley)
- ½ teaspoon Worcestershire
- ¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper
- ¼ teaspoon Old Bay seasoning
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- ½ cup heavy cream

In a small pan, bring water to a boil and reduce heat. Simmer fillets 5 to 7 minutes or until done. Remove fillets. When cool, cut into small pieces; dust lightly with paprika.

Melt butter in sauté pan over medium heat. Cook mushrooms, green onions and garlic until tender, stirring occasionally. Blend in flour until smooth. Gradually stir in chicken broth. Heat to simmering, stirring constantly.

Add white wine, parsley, Worcestershire, cayenne pepper, Old Bay seasoning and lemon juice. Cook for approximately 5 minutes to reduce liquid to desired consistency. Stir in cream, then catfish and heat thoroughly.

Ladle into bowls and top with chopped green onions for garnish.

SCAM WARNING ON OVER-THE PHONE CHEMICAL SALES

Alabama agricultural officials are warning residents of an ongoing over-the-phone chemical sales scam targeting farmers.

These telemarketers are attempting to sell a pesticide product. In one reported case to the Alabama Farmers and Consumers Bulletin, while the product being sold is a real pesticide, the telemarketer is charging much more than what it would sell for in a retail setting, and is claiming the product will last for several years, which is not accurate. Another Bulletin subscriber has reported receiving these telemarketing calls for several years, the latest of which occurred in late June.

According to Tony Cofer, Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Pesticide Management director, farmers should keep the following points in mind when being solicited by telemarketers or buying any products in general:

- Always buy products from reputable stores or suppliers and avoid internet deals or other offers that seem "too good to be true" as they might not be original high quality products.
- Be aware of illegal mobile sellers and those trying to sell products by making false claims.
- Ensure the products have the proper labels with complete instructions in English. This is a legal requirement and one that guarantees the product is authentic.
- Never buy pesticides from anyone who refuses to give a receipt naming the trademark of the products and the quantity purchased.

EPA INTRODUCES GRAPHIC TO INFORM CONSUMERS ABOUT INSECT REPELLENTS

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in July unveiled a new graphic that will be available to appear on insect repellent product labels. The graphic will show consumers how many hours a product will repel mosquitoes and ticks when used as directed.

The EPA's new graphic will do for bug repellents what SPF labeling did for sunscreens. This graphic will help the public better protect themselves and their families from serious health threats caused by mosquitoes and ticks that carry diseases. Incidence of these diseases is on the rise. The Center for Disease Control estimates that there are nearly 300,000 cases of Lyme disease in the United States each year. Effective insect repellents can protect against serious mosquito- and tick-borne diseases.

The EPA is accepting applications from manufacturers that wish to add the graphic to their repellent product labels.






