Due to the number of character spaces required for most E-mail addresses, an advertiser must select either a resident address or an E-mail address. Both cannot be printed.
5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.
6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.
7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. ## AUBURN UNIVERSITY HOSTS LARGEST DAIRY U IN PROGRAM HISTORY

More than 135 students got an up-close look at the dairy industry at the sixth annual Dairy Awareness Introductory Resource for Youth University (Dairy U) in early May. It was the largest crowd in the six-year history of the event, hosted by the Auburn University Animal Sciences Department and the Alabama Cooperative Extension System.

"Dairy U is a hands-on workshop for youth that focuses on dairy cattle and the dairy industry," said Extension Dairy Specialist Boyd Brady, who coordinated the event. "This program allows youth from various backgrounds to learn about the science of dairying."

Extension specialists and Auburn Animal Science professors and students led classes involving a milking demonstration, the gestation cycle of bovines, hormones in vegetables and milk, how to properly administer injections, cattle identification, DNA tracing, bacteria transfer, showmanship and a treat from Dippin' Dots made fresh by

participants.

Participants received awards based on years of completion in the program. Awards included a certificate for first-year participants, a personalized old-fashioned milk bottle for fifth-year students and a Dairy U belt buckle for sixth-year participants.

A commercial dairy heifer show with four weight-based classes followed the awards presentation. The Grand Champion for the Dairy U show was Sarah Traylor, of Wedowee, and the Reserve Grand Champion was Porter Henry, of Montgomery.

"It was exciting to see the youth interested in learning about dairy production," Alabama Farmers Federation Dairy Directory Guy Hall said. "The hands-on educational experience allows the participants to learn about dairy cattle, milk products, genetics and many other facets of the dairy industry."

The sixth annual Dairy U was "a tremendous success," according to Brady.

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
## DATA SNAPSHOTS RANK AG SALES AND PRODUCTION BY STATE AND COUNTY

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) in May released new 2012 Census of Agriculture profiles for all 50 states, Puerto Rico, and more than 3,000 counties in the nation. The Census, which is conducted only once every five years, is the only time that NASS gathers and makes available agriculture data down to the county level for all U.S. counties.

"The state and county profiles provide snapshots of agriculture by highlighting key data from the recently released 2012 Census of Agriculture," said NASS Administrator Joseph T. Reilly. "Census information is heavily relied on at the local level and is an excellent resource for anyone searching for data about farmers and agriculture production in their community."

A variety of data points are included in the profiles to provide a general picture of agriculture in each state and county. Among the information is the number and size

of farms, crop and livestock sales, average government payments per farm, top crop and livestock items, operator characteristics and more.



The state and county profiles are the first in a series of products NASS will publish following the release of the 2012 Census of Agriculture results. NASS will release new tools throughout the year to highlight the more than 6 million data points captured in the agriculture census.

"NASS is committed to providing timely, accurate and useful statistics and part of that is making data as accessible as possible, including more online resources from the Census of Agriculture than ever before," said Reilly. "Next up this summer are the 2012 Congressional District Profiles and Rankings, which will provide insight into agriculture of particular interest to advocates and policymakers."

Many years ago, Laura Hester's mother made a comforter for her bed out of "Red Gingham" checked fabric. Hester says she thinks that is when her love affair for "Red Gingham" began.

Many years later, as the mother of two boys and a dental hygienist by trade, and after watching way too much Martha Stewart living, Hester decided she would like to have a chicken coup and a garden, where she could grow vegetables and flowers. "My husband graciously built them for me and I bought 10 chickens. I decided to try selling my fresh eggs and cut flowers at our local farmers market. It went over quite well, but there is not a lot of money in a few dozen eggs and some bouquets of flowers."

Hester has always enjoyed baking, so she decided to try selling loaves of sourdough bread at the market, which was a huge success. "I added loaves with brown sugar, cinnamon, garlic and Italian seasonings. I also made cinnamon rolls, zucchini bread, cream cheese pound cake and dinner



rolls. I needed a name for my business, and out of the air I said, 'Red Gingham Gourmet' and it stuck," she says.

A chef from a local restaurant who was doing a demo at the farmers market noticed Hester's dinner rolls and asked if she would make them, and cornbread, for his restaurant. "I always had extra cornbread muffins left after filling his order so I started packaging them and taking them to the market. They sold like crazy — it was the perfect fit, fresh vegetables, tomatoes, turnip greens and 'Jalapeno cornbread.'"

The farmers markets close in September and several customers asked about buying the cornbread year round. Hester approached the local grocery stores and they were great to give her a shot.

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## RURAL INVESTIGATORS BUST CATTLE THEFT RING

Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Commissioner John McMillan extends his sincere appreciation for a job well done to the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency's Agriculture Rural Crime Unit (ARCU) for two arrests made in late May related to recent cattle thefts in DeKalb County.

ARCU agents Tim Mathews and Jay Whitehead, along with the DeKalb County Sheriff's Office, arrested brothers, David Grant Fulmer, 28, of Collinsville, and Eddie Ray Fulmer, 31, of Albertville. David Fulmer is charged with two counts of first-degree theft of property. Eddie Fulmer also is charged with two counts of first-degree theft of property, as well as third-degree receiving of stolen property and promoting prison contraband. Both men were booked into the DeKalb County Detention Center May 28 with additional charges pending, according to DeKalb County Sheriff Jimmy Harris.

The arrests came about as a result of teamwork between



the DeKalb County Sheriff's Office and the ARCU. The investigation started when approximately 50 head of cattle went missing in the New Harmony community between May 13-24. Farm equipment also was reported stolen. Two cattle were found shot on County Road 458 on May 25 and ARCU was notified on May 26.

Harris said, "I appreciate all the help we received on this case from the Agriculture Rural Crime Unit. These investigators are very familiar with these types of thefts and

have contacts all over the South to track cattle and livestock movements. This is another case of working together with all available resources to solve crimes."

ARCU Commander Gene Wiggins said, "Through strategic partnerships with local law enforcement throughout the state, over 10 months, our unit has investigated over 100 cases, made 55 arrests, recovered more than \$1.5 million in stolen property."

## Mama's Recipes

July is National Blueberry Month. Next time you fire up the grill, try this Blueberry Barbecue Sauce on ribs, steak or grilled veggies. The sauce adds an intriguing bite of tart sweetness to smoky flavors.

### Blueberry Barbecue Sauce

#### Ingredients:

- 2 cups fresh or frozen blueberries
- ¾ cup ketchup
- ½ cup cider vinegar
- ½ cup packed light brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon light molasses
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 pork tenderloins (1½ to 2 pounds)

Combine blueberries, ketchup, vinegar, brown sugar, molasses, chili powder and black pepper in medium saucepan. Stir in ½ cup water. Bring the mixture to a boil over high heat, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to low and simmer, stirring occasionally until sauce is slightly thickened and chunky. Cool to room temperature, then refrigerate until ready to use.

In a bowl or glass baking dish, coat the tenderloins with 2/3 cup of the sauce. Cover and refrigerate 1 to 4 hours.

When ready to cook, preheat the oven to 400 degrees Fahrenheit. Place the tenderloins in a roasting pan. Discard any marinade left in the bowl. Roast 15 minutes. Turn the tenderloins and spoon on ¼ cup of the remaining barbecue sauce. Roast 12 to 15 minutes longer to an internal temperature of 160 degrees Fahrenheit.

Remove to a platter, cover loosely with aluminum foil and set aside 5 minutes until the temperature rises to 165 degrees Fahrenheit. Slice ½-inch thick and serve with additional barbecue sauce, if desired. Number of servings: 4. Yield: 2-2/3 cup barbecue sauce, 4 to 6 portions tenderloin

# NEW ERA IN CONSERVATION

A new conservation program with an historic focus on public-private partnerships was launched in late May.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said, "We're giving private companies, local communities and other non-government partners a way to invest in what are essentially clean water start-up operations."

The Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) was authorized in the 2014 Farm Bill and streamlines conservation efforts by combining four programs, the Agricultural Water Enhancement Program, Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative, the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Initiative and the Great Lakes Basin Program for Soil Erosion.

The RCPP will award funds to conservation projects designed by local partners.

"Local decision making is empowered through this program — bringing together conservation groups, cities and townships, sportsmen groups, universities, agricultural associations and others — to design conservation projects that are tailored to our needs here in Alabama," said William Puckett, NRCS State Conservationist in Alabama.

The \$1.2 billion in funding over the life of the five-year program will leverage \$2.4 billion for conservation. Projects will improve soil health, water quality and water use efficiency, wildlife habitat and other related natural resources on private lands.

# PEANUT GROWERS APPROVE REFERENDUM

Peanut farmers in Alabama in June unanimously approved the continuation of a statewide peanut checkoff program. Money is collected for the checkoff fund when farmers sell their peanuts at harvest. Those funds are used for education, promotion and research.



Alabama is the second-largest producer of peanuts in the United States. Georgia ranks as the top peanut growing state. Alabama Peanut Producers Association (APPA) President Carl Sanders said the board appreciates the strong showing of support.

"The checkoff program funds many research and educational activities that would not exist if not for the program. These programs directly impact our industry on an annual basis," Sanders said.

Under state law, the checkoff program must be voted on every three years. Twenty-five polling sites were located in 21 counties where peanuts are produced. The APPA administers the checkoff program.

# HUDSONALPHA RESEARCHES BEANS AND CITRUS

Researchers at HudsonAlpha Institute for Biotechnology, in Huntsville, have been working on sequencing the genome of critical food crops, like beans and citrus.

Jeremy Schmutz, of HudsonAlpha's Genome Sequencing Center, and Phillip McClean, of North Dakota State University, have sequenced and analyzed the genome of the common bean to begin identifying genes involved in critical traits, like size, flavor, disease resistance and drought tolerance. The study, which was recently published in *Nature Genetics*, was funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, National Institute of Food and Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Energy Office of Science.

String bean, snap bean, haricot bean, pinto bean and navy bean are just a few members of the common bean family — scientifically called *Phaseolus vulgaris* — and are critical to the global food supply. They provide up to 15 percent of calories and 36 percent of daily protein for parts of Africa and the Americas, serving as a daily staple for hundreds of millions of people.

The researchers learned that, unlike most other food crops, the common bean was domesticated twice by humans about 8,000 years ago — once in Mexico and once in South America — through the selection of largely non-overlapping unique subsets of genes.

“Evolutionarily, this makes the common bean very unique and interesting,” says Schmutz.

Identifying genes involved

in the domestication of the common bean and comparing locally adapted domesticated bean groups to their wild counterparts will help researchers understand how beans evolved, and how modern breeding programs might be improved to yield tastier, more-easily harvested and more nutrient-packed beans. It may also help scientists to develop bean varieties resistant to pests or better able to grow in challenging environments.

“Modern beans have been bred to fill specific expectations with regard to color, size and shape, and as a consequence have very little diversity. Studies such as this are necessary to identify genes that could be used to improve traits,” Schmutz says.

Study co-author McClean says, “The genome sequence has important implications for world-wide efforts to improve beans. The sequence will help breeders release varieties that are competitive with other crops and more climate resilient.”

## Sequencing Citrus Genomes

The sequencing of the genomes of domesticated citrus revealed a very limited genetic diversity that could threaten the crop's survival prospects, according to an international research team including HudsonAlpha's Schmutz and Jane Grimwood.

The international consortium of researchers from the U.S., France, Italy, Spain and Brazil, analyzed and compared 10 diverse citrus varieties, including sweet and sour orange, along with several important mandarin and pummel cultivars.

The team, led by Fred Gmitter of the University of Florida Citrus Research and Education Center, included the U.S. Department of Energy's Joint Genome Institute and HudsonAlpha.

“Citrus is a major U.S. crop, and in Florida, the country's major producer, citrus is being killed now by greening and other diseases,” Schmutz says. “What we've found is that we're planting very similar trees to what were planted 4,000 years ago. These same genotypes do not provide much diversity to resist diseases, and there is very little wild citrus that can be used to easily add diversity to modern citrus. This study shows how understanding the genomics of these plants can help identify sources of diversity, whether from introducing genes from wild species or selecting for desired traits using genetic techniques.”

As citrus varieties are reproduced asexually by vegetative propagation, trees producing a specific type of fruit are typically genetically identical. This produces a uniform, high-quality fruit, but has the drawback that if one tree is susceptible to disease, they all are.

Citrus greening is an insidious emerging infectious disease that destroys entire orchards and there is no cure once a tree is infected. To help defend against this disease and other threats, researchers worldwide are mobilizing to apply genomic tools and approaches to understand how citrus varieties arose and how they respond to disease and other stresses.



Citrus is the world's most widely cultivated fruit crop. In the U.S., the citrus crop was valued at more than \$3.1 billion in 2013.


