HUNTER TREES NAMED 2014 FARM OF DISTINCTION

A Talladega County landscape tree nursery is Alabama's 2014 Farm of Distinction.

Hunter Trees LLC was chosen from four finalists. As this year's winner, brothers Phillip and Will Hunter received \$10,000 in prizes. Phillip Hunter will represent the family farm and Alabama in the Swisher Sweets/Sunbelt Expo Southeastern Farmer of the Year contest at the Sunbelt Ag Expo October 14-16 in Moultrie, Ga.

Located near the town of Alpine, Hunter Trees is known throughout the country as a trusted source for high-quality landscape trees.

"Quality is very important to us," Phillip Hunter says. "Our business, our nursery, is specified a lot by landscape contractors or landscape architects, so they are getting the kind of trees on their jobs that they know are going to look good and make them look good. It's all part of making us all successful."

Ten years ago, however, the business was just a dream for the Hunter brothers. A graduate of Mississippi State University, Phillip was working as a landscape contractor in Birmingham, and Will would soon graduate from Auburn

University with a degree in ornamental horticulture. Together, with their father, Bill, they set out to build one of the South's leading nurseries.

Today, Hunter Trees covers 300 acres of a former sod and row crop farm. It includes 225 acres of production with 125 varieties of trees. On any given day, there are about 65,000 trees growing at the nursery, including some that are so big only two will fit on a semi-trailer.

Phillip says maintaining a clean nursery and good conservation practices are important to the farm's success. "God gave us this land to work with, and we try to be

good stewards of it," he says. "We've done the majority of the work ourselves, and we take pride in that."

Like most farmers, Phillip and wife Robin say the things they like most about agriculture are being around family and nature. "I love to see things grow," he says. "We love to be able to start with a small tree and see it grow to a big tree. It's a great place to work with my family."

Phillip is chairman of the Alabama Farmers Federation Greenhouse, Nursery and Sod Committee and serves on the Alabama Agriculture and Industries Board.

USDA SNAP Sign-up Increases Access to Local Farm Products

In March, more of Alabama's farmers and farmers' markets gained access to potential customers

who spent \$1.4 billion in the state last year.

Alabama families who benefit from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formally known as Food Stamps, now have the option to purchase fresh produce and farm products from local farmers and markets.

Thanks to the success of Farmers' Market SNAP Sign-up Days in Montgomery, sponsored by USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, and Alabama's Department of Agriculture & Industries and Department of Human Resources, more local farmers and farmers' markets will be able to redeem SNAP benefits.

5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.

6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.

7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.

8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. NEW PROGRAM FUNDED TO REDUCE DAMAGE CAUSED BY FERAL SWINE

Autauga County farmer Harold Gaines is hopeful a new federal program will help him get some sleep during planting season. Gaines said last spring, he and his sons, Levi and Dan, worked around the clock to protect fields from feral swine that rooted up seeds and destroyed crops.

The more than 5 million feral swine in the U.S. cause \$1.5 billion in annual damage and control costs, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). More than \$800 million of the damage is incurred by the agriculture industry.

To combat this problem, Congress recently approved \$20 million in funding for the new National Feral Swine Damage Management Program, to be overseen by the Wildlife Services division of APHIS.

"This is a national issue," said APHIS Administrator Kevin Shea, who toured swine damage at Autauga County farms April 15. "We've seen corn that's been trampled and eaten up by the wild pigs. We've seen the traps and fences farmers have to put up. This costs a farmer thousands of dollars."

Shea said the majority of the funding will go directly to operations, and each affected state will develop a plan to reduce or eliminate the feral swine populations.

Officials said some of the funds will be used to address the illegal transportation of pigs for hunting, which is one of the reasons the population has doubled in the last 10 years.

"With this funding, we will work with landowners and property managers to put more active trapping programs in



place; encourage producers to get hogs off their property before they multiply and spread; and hopefully work with state regulatory officials to stop the illegal movement and transport of feral swine," said Charles Brown, the eastern regional director of Wildlife Services.

While feral swine are a problem for farmers, their impact reaches across industries. "They seem to damage every resource category we deal with from property, agriculture and natural resources to human health and safety with diseases," said former Alabama State Wildlife Services Director Frank Boyd.

Shea said the new federal program is just the beginning of a long-term battle.

VETERINARY DIAGNOSTIC LAB SYSTEM UNDER NEW LEADERSHIP

The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries has welcomed Dr. David Pugh as the director of the State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory System.

Prior to joining the department, Pugh worked for Auburn University College of Veterinary Medicine and was one of the first charter parasitologists of the American College of Veterinary Microbiologists.

He earned his BSA, DVM and MS degrees from the University of Georgia, and his MAg in Agricultural Entomology (External Parasites) from Auburn University. He received post-DVM training at Virginia Tech (Equine Clinical Nutrition) and Texas A&M University (Theriogenology). He is a former diplomat of the American College of Theriogenology, the American College of Veterinary Nutrition, and the American College of Veterinary Microbiology.

Pugh was a large animal practitioner for five years in Georgia, and has held faculty positions at the University of Georgia and Auburn University. During his academic career, he taught clinical nutrition and parasitology for horses, cows and small ruminants, and was a clinician in ambulatory medicine and theriogenology. He also was a technical services veterinarian for Fort Dodge Animal Health and Pfizer Animal Health, and recently was the project veterinarian and director of operations for the Auburn Equine Source Plasma Project.

He is the author of more than 600 publications. Pugh has received five university and four national awards for teaching, and was the 2006 recipient of the AM Mills Award for contributions to veterinary medicine.

He has served on various committees for the American

Association of Small Ruminant Practitioners, the Society for Theriogenology, the College of Theriogenology, the American College of Veterinary Nutrition, and the National Research Council, Nutrient Requirement Committee, and the American Academy of Veterinary Parasitologists.

Commissioner John McMillan said, "We are fortunate to have someone with such outstanding qualifications and expertise join our staff to serve in the role as director of the State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory System. We look forward to many years of exceptional direction and leadership by Dr. Pugh."

The department's veterinary diagnostic laboratories identify and investigate diseases of livestock, poultry, wildlife and companion animals. The diagnostic laboratories perform special tests not available at most veterinary practices, such as necropsy (animal autopsy), microscopic examination of tissues, culture for pathogenic bacteria and viruses, testing of blood and serum, and analysis for poisons. Pugh will supervise the department's four diagnostic laboratories across the state, a central laboratory in Auburn and regional laboratories in Boaz, Elba and Hanceville. The Thompson-Bishop-Sparks State Diagnostic Laboratory in Auburn is a member of the USDA National Animal Health Laboratory Network.

process that shouldn't take more than five minutes to complete. AADA does check with your noted short-term lender regarding creditworthiness and it does file a UCC-1 statement on collateral with the Secretary of State. The application fee of \$50 goes to offset some of the administrative cost and the filing fee.



AADA is a separate public corporation and not a part of the state government. It works closely with the State Agricultural Department, but has its own board of directors and no state funding. Loan processing is totally via AADA staff with all loans and correspondence, approval and collections stemming from staff decisions. In most all cases, loan processing is quick with loan funding coming straight from the AADA account.

Alabama Agricultural Development Authority (AADA) has forked out roughly \$1 million for hay barns during the past few years. Hay barns have become an extremely important part of most cow-calf operations around the state and have proven to be quite cost effective. Whether construction is wood or (preferably) metal, the resultant storage capacity goes a long way in preserving hay quality.

A 40'x60' barn holds roughly 225-250 +/- bales with a 50'x100' barn holding upwards to 350 +/- rolls. Respective loan amounts are \$12,500 and \$25,000 at 4 percent with a four-year amortization schedule. AADA prefers two payments per year, but tries to schedule these payments around sale dates. AADA does not take the hay barn or land as collateral, but does insist on a first lien position on machinery or equipment. Appropriate insurance is required on the hay barn.

The application for hay barn funding is a one page, simple

KNOW HOW TO PREVENT INVASIVE PLANTS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is amplifying its public outreach about the risks that invasive plant pests, diseases and harmful weeds pose to America's crops and forests — and how the public can help prevent their spread. These non-native, destructive species can seriously harm the economy, environment or even human health.


“Invasive species threaten the health and profitability of U.S. agriculture and forestry, and the many jobs these sectors support,” says Kevin Shea, administrator of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). “To protect that crucial value, USDA and its partners work hard every day to keep invasive pests and diseases out of the United States and to control those that may slip in.”

Invasive plant pests and diseases can jeopardize entire industries such as U.S. citrus or hardwood timber. For just one disease — huanglongbing

(HLB or citrus greening), in one state, Florida — the losses are alarming: more than \$4.5 billion in lost citrus production from the 2006-07 to 2010-11 production seasons. Scientists have estimated the cost of all invasive species to all economic sectors to be approximately \$120 billion yearly.

With stakes this high, public awareness and action become

key elements in protecting America's agricultural and natural resources. APHIS created its Hungry Pests public outreach program to empower Americans with the knowledge they need to leave these “hungry pests” behind. For instance, invasive pests can hitchhike in and on the things we move and pack, such as firewood, plants, fruits and vegetables, outdoor furniture and agricultural products



ordered online.

So, APHIS is asking Americans to visit HungryPests.com to learn what invasive plant pests and diseases are in their states or threaten it. Get information about damaging pests that USDA and its partners are combatting right now, especially tree-killing pests that are beginning to emerge this spring and into the summer. Individual citizens play a vital role.

DISASTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM SIGN-UP UNDERWAY

Sign-up is now underway for disaster assistance programs, reestablished and strengthened by the 2014 Farm Bill, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Quick implementation of the programs has been a top priority for USDA. To expedite applications, all producers who experienced losses are encouraged to collect records documenting these losses in preparation for the enrollment in disaster assistance programs. Information on the types of records necessary can be provided by local FSA county offices. Producers also are encouraged to contact county offices ahead of time to schedule an appointment.

“These programs will provide long-awaited disaster relief for many livestock producers who have endured significant financial hardship

from weather-related disasters while the programs were expired and awaiting Congressional action,” said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. “President Obama and I prioritized the implementation of these disaster assistance programs now that the Farm Bill has restored and strengthened them.”

The Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) will provide payments to eligible producers for livestock deaths and grazing losses that have occurred since the expiration of the livestock disaster assistance programs in 2011, and including calendar years 2012, 2013 and 2014.

LIP provides compensation to eligible livestock producers that have suffered livestock death losses in excess of normal mortality due to adverse weather. Eligible

livestock includes beef cattle, dairy cattle, bison, poultry, sheep, swine, horses and other livestock as determined by the Secretary.

LFP provides compensation to eligible livestock

producers that have suffered grazing losses due to drought or fire on publicly managed land. An eligible livestock producer must own, cash lease, or be a contract grower of eligible livestock during the 60 calendar days before the beginning date of the qualifying drought or fire in a county that is rated by the U.S. Drought Monitor as D2, D3 or D4.

Enrollment also has begun for producers with losses covered by the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) and the Tree Assistance Program (TAP).

ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish that have

losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, such as blizzards and wildfires, as determined by the Secretary of Agriculture.

TAP provides financial assistance to qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes and vines damaged by natural disasters. USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) employees have worked exceptionally hard over the past two months to ensure eligible farmers and ranchers would be able to enroll to receive disaster relief on April 15.

"In the past, the lack of technology prevented farmers and farmers markets from accepting SNAP benefits, which are processed using electronic benefit transactions (EBT)," said Don Wambles, Farmers Market Authority director. "Our staff is conducting sign-up sessions for farmers and farmers markets this Spring to assist them in getting authorized to receive free equipment that will process SNAP, debit and

credit card transactions."

Interested farmers and farmers' markets can contact the state to find out if they qualify for federal grants for free wireless point-of-sale equipment and internet access, or can visit the new MarketLink website as an additional way to get authorized as SNAP vendors and get the equipment they need to accept SNAP benefits.

"Today, of the nearly 8,000

farmers' markets in the United States, about half accept SNAP payments," said FNS Southeast Deputy Regional Administrator Erin Swanson-Hall in March. "At the same time, many SNAP recipients, especially in urban areas, are unaware that their SNAP EBT cards can be used to purchase fresh products directly from authorized farmers or farmers' markets. We're working to change that."

FNS' work to improve childhood nutrition and empower families to make healthier food choices by expanding the availability of healthy food is supported when

farmers and farmers markets accept SNAP.

"It's very important that people eat healthy and nutritious meals," said DHR spokesperson Barry Spear. "Improving access to fresh fruits and vegetables at farmers markets across the state will certainly help make it easier for SNAP recipients to purchase and prepare healthy foods."



COURT RULING UNDERSCORES IMPORTANCE OF FARM SAFETY MANAGEMENT PLAN

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, as the saying goes. In the case of one farm owner, this missed ounce of prevention may cost millions of dollars.

An Alabama jury recommended awarding \$4 million to a farm worker who sustained horrific mutilation from operating farm equipment.

The jury decided that the worker's employer, a Conecuh County farmer, should pay the sum for failing to provide the employee adequate warning or training to operate a tractor-driven post-hole digger. The worker was injured while operating the digger to fence approximately 40 acres, according to an article posted January 22 on al.com.



Four Critical Mistakes

At Auburn University, Dr. Jesse LaPrade, the Alabama Cooperative Extension System's farm safety specialist, says the ruling stemmed from what was perceived as four mistakes on the part of the farmer. These include not providing the employee with safety instructions; not providing safe equipment; not providing a user's manual for the equipment by which the employee was injured; and, finally, providing instructions for operating the equipment that ran contrary to the manual instructions.

"If the farmer had merely followed these four basic safeguards, he never would have ended up in court, nor would the worker likely have been injured," LaPrade says.

"The farm owner did not call the phone number, clearly inscribed on the digging equipment, to request a copy of the operating manual," he says, adding that attorneys subsequently involved in the lawsuit called the number, requested a copy of the manual from the manufacturer and received one a few days later.

"If the employee had been provided this manual and then requested to sign a form attesting that he had been informed of this fact, it's likely that the farm owner may have avoided court," LaPrade says.

OSHA Regs a Top Priority

"One of the main priorities of famers should be familiarizing themselves with Occupational Safety and Health Administration requirements that relate to employees and to comply with them," LaPrade stresses.

LaPrade has developed a site with the sole purpose of acquainting farm owners with their responsibilities under OSHA.

"The farm safety management plan puts OSHA law into action," he says.

The site, which can be accessed at www.aces.edu/farmsafety, outlines the OSHA regulations that apply to farmers and also how to comply with these regulations.

"The site provides a check list to help producers' identify the sites and equipment on their farm that potentially carry the most injury risk and that should

form the bases for training as part of a comprehensive farm safety management plan," LaPrade says.

Identify All Potential Risks on the Farm

He says all identified safety risks must be corrected according to the specifications outlined in the farm safety management plan forms posted on the website.

Once a farm safety management plan is completed, farm owners and operators are required to keep all related forms on file, including copies of worker training verification forms and self-site safety inspections, which should be conducted at least twice annually, he says.

Likewise, any serious injuries that occur on the farm should be carefully documented, including steps outlining how they could have been prevented. Under OSHA regulations, any injury that requires medical assistance and at least one lost day of work ranks as a serious injury and should be documented and permanently filed, according to LaPrade.

SCAM WARNING ON OVER-THE-PHONE CHEMICAL SALES TO FARMERS

Alabama agricultural officials are warning residents of an over-the-phone chemical sales scam targeting farmers.

These telemarketers are attempting to sell a pesticide product. In one reported case to the Alabama Farmers and Consumers Bulletin, while the product being sold is a real pesticide, the telemarketer is charging much more than what it would sell for in a retail setting, and is claiming the product will last for several years, which is not accurate.

According to Tony Cofer, Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Pesticide Management director, farmers should keep the following points in mind when being solicited by telemarketers or buying any products in general:

- Always buy products from reputable stores or suppliers and avoid internet deals or other offers that seem "too good to be true" as they might not be original high quality products.
- Be aware of illegal mobile sellers and those trying to sell products by making false claims.
- Ensure the products have the proper labels with complete instructions in English. This is a legal requirement and one that guarantees the product is authentic.
- Never buy pesticides from anyone who refuses to give a receipt naming the trademark of the products and the quantity purchased.


