### Drones Help Farmers Manage Crops and Livestock

Alabama Gov. Robert Bentley created the Alabama Drone Task Force in June

to review the necessary requirements to further Alabama's potential use of drones in areas of agriculture, conservation and law enforcement.

The task force is chaired by Agriculture and Industries Commissioner John McMillan and includes Alabama Department of Transportation Director John Cooper, Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Director Gunter Guy, Alabama Law Enforcement Agency Secretary Spencer Collier and Montgomery Airport Authority Board Member Jimmy Reynolds.

In a release, Bentley said, "I

## ALABAMA NRCS 2015 SMALL FARMERS OF THE YEAR

Joe and Patty Lambrechts, of Oakview Farms in Elmore County, have been named the Alabama Natural Resources Conservation Service 2015 Small Farmers of the Year.

A plaque and engraved clock were presented to the Lambrechts at the Federation of Southern Cooperative's 47<sup>th</sup> annual meeting in Epes in September.

"The Lambrechts are good stewards of the land and we are pleased to honor them with this award," said Acting NRCS State Conservationist Ben Malone.

After retiring several years ago, the Lambrechts began developing their 21-acre farm. They opened Oakview Farms Granary, a part-time stone burr gristmill, in 1998. It was so successful, they opened it full time in 2004. The gristmill provides high quality, fresh stone-ground cornmeal and grits to its customers online

and in its general store.

In addition, the Lambrechts have two greenhouses of hydroponic lettuce, half an acre of Asian persimmons, one-and-a-half acres of strawberries, two-and-a-half acres of blueberries and 10 acres of seasonal vegetables that includes tomatoes, onions and fingerling potatoes. They also have chickens for fresh eggs and composted litter, honey bees for pollination and raw honey and pastured goats.

The Lambrechts market their products to customers at their general store, many high-end restaurants, local farmers markets and local businesses. "Our restaurant partners desire sustainable and locally-grown foods and the demand continues to increase," said Patty Lambrecht.

Working with the Elmore County Soil and Water Conservation District using NRCS financial and technical

assistance, the Lambrechts installed underground spring systems to supply water to their pastured goats and built fencing for rotational grazing. They installed a seasonal high tunnel (hoop house), soil erosion prevention measures like cover crops, and micro-irrigation for fruits and vegetables. Their U-pick and We-pick operations and crops are in high demand. The community trusts their sustainable, environmentally friendly growing methods.

The Lambrechts are also involved in the community and offer their leadership to youth, agricultural and community organizations. They sponsor 4H clubs, initiate fundraisers, host educational and outreach tours, mentor fellow producers and offer their services as consultants and speakers. They share some of their bounty with the community by donating to local food banks.

Due to the number of character spaces required for most E-mail addresses, an advertiser must select either a resident address or an E-mail address. Both cannot be printed.
5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.
6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.
7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. The e-mail address is afcb@agi.alabama.gov and the fax number is 334/240-7169.
9. Ads which are to be repeated must be submitted for each issue.

## PRODUCT SPOTLIGHT

Headquartered in Birmingham, Buffalo Rock Co. is one of the largest single-family privately owned Pepsi-Cola bottlers. Today it operates 14 distribution centers in Alabama, Florida and Georgia, servicing a population of more than 6 million.

The story of Buffalo Rock spans over 100 years and four generations of the Lee family. Beginning in the late 1800's, with the founding of Alabama Grocery Co. by Sidney W. Lee, the firm moved into the soft drink business when Lee and a Selma chemist, Ashby Coleman, developed Buffalo Rock Ginger Ale. The company was renamed Buffalo Rock and for the next 30 years, its main products were Buffalo Rock Ginger Ale, Mission Orange, Mission Grape and B-1.

Sidney Lee passed the company onto his son, James C. Lee Sr., and when Lee Sr. died in 1951, his son, James C. Lee Jr., assumed leadership.

Under Lee Jr.'s leadership, the company purchased the



Birmingham Pepsi-Cola franchise and added Dr. Pepper and Seven Up to its product line, making Buffalo Rock the first production plant in the country to bottle three major brands under one roof. Buffalo Rock acquired the worldwide rights to Grapico in 1981 and developed Dr. Wham in 2005.

Known as a leader and innovator, Buffalo Rock developed the highly successful 3-liter bottle in 1984, and in 1986, it scored another marketing first with the introduction of the 20-Pak Mini-Case for 12-ounce cans. Later, it developed the 12-ounce and 20-ounce bottles.

With the additions of coffee services, bottled waters, specialty juices, isotonic and new age beverages, Buffalo Rock became known throughout the industry as a total beverage company. In 1985, Buffalo Rock began its full line vending operations, which have expanded throughout every distribution center. The company now operates and services cafeterias, food lines and snack bars, and offers catering services. Buffalo Rock Co. has grown to become one of the region's largest providers of full line vending and food services, and is currently the largest general foods distributor.

believe drone use can benefit the state now and for generations to come, because drones offer many advantages to help our farmers and law enforcement agencies be successful.”

Alabama Farmers Federation President Jimmy Parnell praised Bentley’s leadership in creating the task force. “Unmanned aerial vehicles, or drones, have the potential to help farmers better manage crops and livestock,” Parnell said. “We appreciate the governor’s proactive efforts to explore how we can best use this technology while protecting private property rights. The governor’s statement and choice of Commissioner McMillan to lead this group shows his interest in helping provide farmers the tools they need to be more successful.”

The creation of the task force was followed by an announcement by the Federal Aviation Administration effectively grounding drones for commercial use.

Agricultural researchers have worked with Alabama farmers to demonstrate how drones can be paired with video cameras and sophisticated mapping software to provide

producers better information about irrigation, soil conditions, plant health, animal care and pest management.

“The thing about a UAV is that it gives you a whole new perspective when we talk about agriculture,” said John Fulton, ACES Extension specialist and professor in the Department of Biosystems Engineering at Auburn University. “There’s a tremendous amount of opportunity to collect data or images, check cows or go out after a rain to see where water is standing.”

After the first meeting of the task force, McMillan said, “There are many challenges for this task force in dealing with the multitude of issues involved with this emerging technology.”

McMillan also encouraged interested parties to attend the committee meetings and offer comments. “One important objective is to be as transparent as possible to enable people to participate in this process.”

## NAVIGATING THE 2014 FARM BILL

Alabama farmers need a road map to utilize the many programs under the umbrella of the 2014 Farm Bill. The Alabama Cooperative Extension System has launched a website, [www.alabamafarmbill.com](http://www.alabamafarmbill.com), to provide the state's farmers with information and tools to help them access program information relevant to their agricultural operations.

The website is an outgrowth of the Alabama Farm Bill Task Force organized to anticipate, plan and address 2014 Farm Bill educational needs in Alabama.

Dr. Paul Brown, Alabama Extension associate director,

says farmers will need to give careful study to the new program options of the 2014 Farm Bill, especially related to row-crops and dairy.

"The Alabama Farm Bill Task Force was created to ensure that the state's farmers have easy access to important and timely information as farm program rules and regulations are developed," Brown said. "This website acts as a clearinghouse for Farm Bill information provided by USDA agencies and relevant to Alabama."

[AlabamaFarmBill.com](http://AlabamaFarmBill.com) provides information on program developments, including program deadlines

and planning tools.

"Research shows that agriculture and related industries are Alabama's largest economic engine — generating about \$70.4 billion annually," Brown said. "Agriculture and forestry together comprise the state's second largest employer, providing more than 575,000 jobs. It is vital that we provide farmers with easy access to information and other resources that enable them to make the correct decisions for their operations. Their contributions to the state's economy are too important to the economic health of the entire state."

## PESTICIDE PROGRAM HITS MILLION-POUND MILESTONE

In late September, the Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Waste Pesticide Disposal Clean Day Program surpassed 1 million pounds collected since the program started in 1994.

At a collection day in Henry County, agricultural producers dropped off 72,665 pounds of pesticides for disposal, putting the program at 1,024,615 pounds.

"Alabama was an early leader in helping farmers dispose of unwanted pesticides," said Agricultural Commissioner John McMillan. "Old pesticides can become a safety hazard and environmental liability through long-term storage in barns and other areas around the farm. Twenty years ago, farmers had very few options for responsible management of pesticides that were phased out by manufacturers, cancelled for use or just too old and unusable."

The program is paid for through grant money, which is not always a stable funding source, said Program Director Tony Cofer. "We work diligently to secure funding to offer this service to the farmers free of charge and we are excited to reach this million-pound milestone."

The program rotates collection days among all 67 counties so that each county has a collection day opportunity. Collections are handled in partnership with the Alabama Cooperative Extension System offices. In special situations, ag department staff will go to a home or farm to assist with materials.

"This program is truly beneficial for Alabama," McMillan said. "Many states do not have a program like this one, and we feel like this is the right thing to do in helping our farmers. Our program helps make sure these products are collected and disposed of in a way that protects our land and water resources."
