

Standing Up for Farmers and Landowners

In mid-June, I attended the Southern Association of State Departments of Agriculture (SASDA) annual meeting held in Atlanta, Georgia. I was humbled to be elected as president for the organization over the next year.

Serving along with me will be Tennessee Commissioner Julius Johnson as vice president, Mississippi Commissioner Cindy Hyde-Smith as secretary, and Texas Commissioner Sid Miller as treasurer. SASDA is comprised of 15 southern states, along with the territories of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. The annual SASDA conference will be hosted by Alabama in June 2016 in Point Clear.

SASDA works hand-in-hand with NASDA, the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture. The networking provided by these groups is invaluable to the future of agriculture across our nation. We have the ability to share ideas, establish solutions, and implement policy as related to American agriculture.

I look forward to working with my colleagues as we discover ways to address the many challenges we face in the agricultural community, such as the impending threat of Avian Influenza (AI), compliance with the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) rules, compliance with the most recent Country of Origin Labeling (COOL) requirements or even dealing with federal regulations, such as Waters of the U.S. (WOTUS) rule. All SASDA and NASDA members approach these issues with a common accountability to the farmers and consumers of their respective states.

Overall, we are disappointed the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) did not provide state co-regulators and others impacted by this rule an opportunity to review and provide feedback on the changes made in the final

PROPANE-POWERED VANS SHOWCASED AT AG & INDUSTRY EVENT

The Alabama Department of Corrections (ADOC) sets the bar for cleaner, cheaper fuel alternatives as they recently converted 10 vans to a propane-based fuel system. The vans are used to transport inmates to their work release job assignments.

According to the Propane Education & Research Council (2015), propane is more environmentally responsible, less expensive, better for engines and more energy efficient than gasoline.

With this in mind, Dr. Andy Farquhar, director of

the ADOC's Correctional Industries Division and the Department's Energy Officer, spearheaded the project to switch fuels after attending several conferences and road shows sponsored by Auburn University, ADECA and the Alabama Clean Fuels Coalition (ACFC). Farquhar and his staff have been investigating the implementation of alternative fuels within the ADOC for several years through cooperative projects with Auburn University on biomass production, conversion of institutional food waste to energy, and recycling of spent kitchen cooking oils. -

The idea to convert the ADOC vans arose at an ACFC Propane Road Show in 2012 where Farquhar heard a presentation by a rural transit authority operator in West Point, Mississippi who had positive results from converting their 15-passenger vans to a propane-gasoline bi-fuel system. "That's when the lightbulb came on," Farquhar said. At that time ADOC was spending over \$1.3 million per year on gasoline for its fleet of 77 work release vans, with each van traveling an average of 50-60,000 miles per year.

It was also discovered that


GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING ADS

1. Only those ads which pertain to agricultural or forestry products and to those items employed in the actual growth, harvesting and disposal of such products will be accepted.
2. Ads should be typed or printed. Those ads that are not legible will not be published.
3. Ads must be limited to 20 words. This does not include name, address or phone number.
4. Ads must include name, address, city, zip code, area code/phone number and county, no "Farm Names or Work Names/Addresses." Only two phone numbers will be listed. Due to the number of character spaces required for most E-mail addresses, an advertiser must select either a resident address or an E-mail address. Both cannot be printed.
5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.
6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.
7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. The e-mail address is afcb@agi.alabama.gov and the fax number is 334/240-7169.
9. Ads which are to be repeated must be submitted for each issue.

Morris Bell

We are continuing to spotlight an employee each month to put a face with the many services provided by the Department of Agriculture and Industries. We hope you enjoy getting to know more about our excellent employees!

Our Spotlight Employee of the Month is Morris Bell. Morris has worked for the state for 23 years and for the Department of Agriculture and Industries for 20 of those years. He is a Consumer Weights and Measures Protection Specialist in the Weights and Measures Division.

Morris's primary responsibilities include inspecting gasoline pumps for calibration using the five-gallon volume tester. When he first arrives at the gas station, he checks the holding tanks to be sure there is no water in the tanks because any water in the fuel would damage a consumer's vehicle. Also, while at the station, he collects samples from all three grades of gasoline, 87, 89 and 93, and submits those samples back to a laboratory for octane and ethanol testing.

Morris also visits retail stores and checks packages for "tare" weight. "Tare" weight, for example, is when you go into a deli to purchase potato salad, the deli is not allowed to charge you for the container that the potato salad is packaged in. Morris verifies that the charge is only for the product being sold, not the container it is being sold in. Morris also inspects scales at

ALABAMA & ARKANSAS STIFFEN LABELING OF CATFISH-LIKE IMPORTS

To make it easier for consumers to obtain information they need when ordering catfish in restaurants, Alabama and Arkansas have amended their country of origin labeling requirements.



Soon restaurants in each state will have

to identify the country of origin of both catfish and catfish-like species, including imported pangasius (also known as basa, tra and swai).

must identify the actual country of origin of catfish or catfish-like fish served. The new Arkansas law goes into effect January 1, 2016.

The recently amended Alabama statute requires restaurants to identify on the menu, or in a conspicuous location, the country of origin of catfish and catfish-like species they serve. The new Alabama law goes into effect August 1.

Consumers and restaurants should choose safe, high quality 100 percent American grown and processed U.S. farm-raised catfish. To better protect consumers, America's catfish farmers support all federal and state efforts to improve inspections of foreign imports and enhance country of origin labeling of catfish and catfish-like species.

In Arkansas, similar legislation has been enacted requiring imported catfish and catfish-like species to be identified as such on restaurant menus. Upon request, a restaurant

AU COLLEGE OF AG, CUBA SIGN ACADEMIC EXCHANGE TREATY

Less than six months after the U.S. announced plans to restore diplomatic and economic ties with Cuba, Auburn University's College of Agriculture has entered a partnership with the Agrarian University of Havana and the Cuban National Center for Animal and Plant Health that paves the way for faculty and student exchange programs and collaborative research efforts between Auburn agriculture and the Cuban institutions.

The five-year agreement was the culmination of a

process that got underway more than five years ago, when the College of Agriculture began working to establish academic relationships in the communist island. Henry Fadamiro, College of Agriculture assistant dean and Office of Global Programs director, signed the treaty on behalf of the college and Auburn.

Activities authorized in the agreement include faculty, staff and student exchange programs; joint research, teaching and extension projects; graduate and undergraduate coursework

at both universities; special short-term courses; and cultural exchange undertakings.

The agreement also provides the legal framework for expansion of the academic collaboration with Cuba to other colleges and programs at Auburn, Fadamiro said.

"Not only that, but it sets the stage for the State of Alabama and the nation of Cuba to begin a relationship that can be huge economically, here and in Cuba," Fadamiro said.

ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR USDA ORGANIC COST SHARE PROGRAMS

Growers and handlers of organic agricultural products now can recover part of the cost of their USDA certification. The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries (ADAI) will be allocated \$15,800 to reimburse producers and handlers who either obtain or renew their organic certification in the federal fiscal year that ends September 30, 2015. The reimbursement covers 75 percent of certification costs, up to a maximum of \$750.

The Organic Certification Cost Share Programs (OCCSP) reimburse eligible organic crop and livestock producers and handlers for a portion of their organic certification costs. The OCCSP consist of the following two programs authorized by separate pieces

of legislation: the National Organic Certification Cost Share Program (NOCCSP) authorized by the Agriculture Act of 2014, commonly known as the Farm Bill, and the Agricultural Management Assistance (AMA) authorized by the Federal Crop Insurance Act of 2001.

"We encourage organic producers to participate in this program and hope that it will help them recoup some of the expenses associated with becoming a USDA certified organic operation," Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries John McMillan said.

The ADAI will administer this noncompetitive grant program by processing applications for cost share



funds, and USDA will reimburse them. USDA distributes funds on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted. Organic operators typically submit a one-page application form, a W-9 Tax Form, proof of certification, an itemized invoice of certification expenses, and proof of E-Verify to ADAI. The ADAI reviews the application and then may reimburse the operator for 75 percent of the cost of certification, up to a maximum of \$750 per category

of certification per year.

All farmers, ranchers and handlers who have received organic certification or a renewal of certification from an accredited certifying agent between October 1, 2014 and September 30, 2015 are eligible to participate. Farms transitioning to organic production are not eligible. Most certification-related costs are eligible for reimbursement. Organic producers and handlers may be reimbursed for expenses paid for first-time organic certifications, as well as renewals of certification.

Eligible costs include the following: application fees, inspection costs, travel/per diem for inspectors, user fees, sales assessments and postage.

Ineligible costs include the following: equipment, materials, supplies, late fees and inspections for transitional certifications or due to violations of NOP regulations. The OCCSP reduce the cost of organic certification in accordance with the Agricultural Marketing Service aim to strengthen market support for U.S. agriculture.

Applications will be accepted through September 30, 2015. Blueberry Crisp

Ingredients:

6 cups Blueberries, fresh or frozen	½ cup brown sugar, packed
2 teaspoons lemon juice	1 cup all purpose flour
½ cup butter	1 cup quick cooking oats
1 teaspoon cinnamon	½ cup chopped pecans
1 cup water	

Place blueberries and water in buttered 9x13 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Stir together brown sugar, flour, oats and cinnamon. Stir ¼ cup of flour mixture into blueberries. Cut butter into remaining flour mixture until it becomes crumbly. Stir pecans into flour mixture. Sprinkle flour mixture evenly over blueberry mixture. Bake at 375 degrees 30 to 40 minutes until bubbly and browned on top. Serve warm or at room temperature, plain or with ice cream.

WOTUS rule. Because of its far-reaching impacts, it is imperative we have a rule that works for state regulatory agencies and impacted stakeholders.

Last year, NASDA members voted to call on EPA and USACE to withdraw the proposed WOTUS rule and collaborate with state departments of agriculture and other stakeholders on the appropriate scope of federal Clean Water Act jurisdiction. NASDA also submitted comments to both agencies, articulating concerns with the proposed rule.

As a group we will continue to monitor this rule and its far reaching effects on the private property rights of farmers and private citizens across the U.S. Meanwhile, the U.S. House of Representatives Appropriations Committee voted out of committee the 2016 U.S. Department of Interior (DOI) and EPA Funding bill, which would essentially eliminate funding for the EPA's implementation of the WOTUS rule.

In May, the U.S. House passed two bills: one included language to prevent the USACE from spending any funds to implement the WOTUS rule,

and the other gives the EPA and the USACE 30 days to withdraw the current proposed rule that defines WOTUS under the Clean Water Act (CWA), and charges them with developing a new proposed rule. To read the final rule and EPA news release, visit www2.epa.gov/cleanwaterrule.

As SASDA president, I concur with our Association's eagerness to work alongside NASDA to amplify its credible expertise between industry and the federal government to influence priority policies and programs in agencies and Congress. Working as a unified force, we can have a greater impact on federal policies that affect the bottom line of farmers and foresters.
