## APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR SPECIALTY CROP GRANTS

The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries (ADAI) is accepting grant applications for projects that enhance the competitiveness of U.S. specialty crops in foreign and domestic markets.

The application deadline for these specialty crop block grants through the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is May 13 by 5 p.m.

Specialty crops are defined by the USDA as fruits and vegetables, dried fruit, tree nuts, horticulture (including maple syrup and honey) and nursery crops (including floriculture).

Commodity groups, agricultural organizations, colleges and universities, state agencies and agricultural nonprofits are all eligible for this grant program, provided their proposals meet all the specifications. The USDA has final approval for projects submitted. The ADAI and a review committee of industry representatives will make the application evaluation review and award recommendations.


The specialty crops block grant is a competitive grant process. The maximum award to any applicant is \$25,000; the minimum, \$5,000.

Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries John McMillan said, "The department looks forward to implementing the 2016 Specialty Crop Block Grant Program under supervision of USDA."

Projects cannot begin until the USDA has made its official award announcement, expected by October 2016.

## GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING ADS

Following are the guidelines for advertising in the classified section of the Alabama Farmers and Consumers Bulletin. Adherence to these rules will ensure quick processing of ads. All ads that do not meet the following guidelines will not be published.

1. Only those ads which pertain to agricultural or forestry products and to those items employed in the actual growth, harvesting and disposal of such products will be accepted.

2. Ads should be typed or printed. Those ads that are not legible will not be published.

3. Ads must be limited to 20 words. This does not include name, address or phone number.

4. Ads must include name, address, city, zip code, area code/phone number and county, no "Farm Names or Work Names/Addresses." Only two phone numbers will be listed. Due to the number of character spaces required for most E-mail addresses, an advertiser must select either a resident address or an E-mail address. Both cannot be printed.

5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.

6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.

7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.

8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. The e-mail address is afcb@agi.alabama.gov and the fax number is 334/240-7169.

9. Ads which are to be repeated must be submitted for each issue.

10. Land advertised/wanted must be minimum of 10 acres or more. Ads will not be accepted from dealers or persons selling land on a commission basis. Information on housing should be limited. Ads should reflect descriptions of the land/farm.

11. Only livestock (herding/working) dogs will be published in the Bulletin.

12. Instructional material cannot be advertised in the Bulletin.

13. Ads will be accepted for agricultural work only. Ads for household, nursing or companionship will not be accepted.

14. Ads to exchange one item for another item will be accepted only when both items being exchanged relate to agriculture. Ads for cars, boats, mobile homes, etc. will not be accepted as an exchange for agricultural items.

15. Prices must be included with all items offered for sale. Price ranges may be used in certain ads; for example, due to age, weight, etc. cattle can be advertised as \$1,200-\$1,500.

16. We will only advertise birds listed in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) book. Notices from poultry dealers, order buyers or persons selling on commission cannot be accepted. Dustin also assists in regulating individuals or companies that have obtained a commercial applicators license from the department. He does this by conducting random checks of their application records. Commercial applicators are required to keep accurate records of how much pesticide they spray, where they spray it and how much they used.

Dustin said his favorite part of his job is that no one day is the same. He enjoys interacting with the public and having the opportunity to meet new people.

Dustin and his wife, Andrea, have been married for almost 10 years and live in Arab. They have two active young sons, Hayden (7) and Holt (5).

## POLLEN...BUT WHY?

When spring rolls around, people's allergies flare up and pollen is usually to blame. However, pollen is a necessity in nature that people cannot live without. The sole purpose of pollen is to reproduce the plant.

“If we don't have pollen floating through the air, then the ovules in the female part of the flower are not fertilized, so they do not produce seed and that species will become extinct,” said Dr. Dale Monks, director of Research Operations in Agronomic Crops at Auburn University.

Some plants are self-pollinating, while others, like corn, are wind pollinated. Other plants require a pollinator.

“Some pollen is heavier than others, so the pollen that you see from a pine tree is thick, heavy and yellow, but that is not the kind that people are usually allergic to. People are usually allergic to oak, flower or weed pollen,”

said Monks. “Wind-pollinated plants are often the ones that give people the most problems because their pollen grains are small and plentiful and can be easily carried by the wind for miles.”

There is also a need for pollinators that carry the pollen from plant to plant.

“Bees, hummingbirds and anything that walks across a flower and goes to another flower, transferring the pollen, enables the crops to grow,”

Monks said. “Bees and other insects play a crucial role in cross-pollination for many of our food crops.

Honey bees, in particular, are important pollinators in the United States and around the world. Many fruits are either completely or partially dependent on pollinating insects. Melons and cucurbits require from five to seven bee visits to each blossom to set large amounts of good quality fruit.

# PRESCRIBED FIRE IN MIXED PINE-HARDWOOD FORESTS

Prescribed fire is a useful tool to help manage for timber and wildlife if implemented appropriately. While blackening of a tree's bark is perceived by the public as damaging to the tree, this is generally untrue and only aesthetically unpleasant for a short time.

To cause true permanent injury to a tree, the cambium layer – located between the bark and wood – must be heated to 120 degrees Fahrenheit for about one hour. If the cambium temperature reaches 147 degrees, tissue death is instant. A tree's bark is the only defense it has to protect against damage from fire.

All bark is not created equal, however. Bark from different trees looks different and the insulating qualities are different. In general, trees with the thickest bark are most resistant to fire damage.

A good rule of thumb concerning plants and fire is if a tree is resistant to fire damage it will produce by-products that help carry a fire, such as the resinous needles of pine trees. On the other hand, a tree that lacks good fire resistance produces by-products that are difficult to burn. Pine trees produce bark that is thicker and has better insulating qualities than hardwood trees. For this reason, many managers still prefer to only use fire within pine stands where the thick bark creates a relatively effective barrier to protect the inner cambium layer from high temperatures that accompany flames.

Some land managers have begun using control burning in mixed pine-hardwood stands that were traditionally considered off limits to accomplish goals, such as fuel reduction and to kill undesirable small hardwoods in a mature forest. Conducted properly under certain conditions, controlled burning is a valid management approach to protect the long-term health of the forest.

A proper fuel reduction burn within a hardwood stand should be done on a very cold

day when the ambient air temperature is helping keep the tree cool as the fire passes. An air temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit would provide an 80-degree zone of safety before damage is initiated.

It should be noted that no hardwood tree is classified as highly resistant to fire damage. In fact, the only tree native to Alabama considered highly resistant to damage is the longleaf pine.

If the cambium is damaged, it will cause fire scars that result in rotting in the trunk. This will hurt the aesthetics and productivity of the tree in addition to severely reducing its value when the time comes to sell the timber.

Always use backing fires when possible and make sure all firebreaks are adequate.

Have your burn plan looked over by a professional forester or prescribed burn manager. Make sure the weather conditions call for low winds and relative humidity in the 40-45 percent range. It is also helpful if there is a forecast of rain in the next few days. The results will be a "cool" fire that doesn't kill trees or bushes but simply cleans up the forest floor by removing litter that would otherwise takes years to decompose. The wildlife in the area will respond positively to the changes in the habitat.

## COVER CROP TERMINATION PROVIDES BENEFITS

Farmers have been integrating precision practices in the field for many years, including cover crops.

Dr. Dennis Delaney, Alabama Extension Soybean and Conservation Cropping Systems Specialist, said there is a strategic balance between cover crop management and cover crop benefits.

"The balancing act is going to be different for every producer," Delaney said. "The longer producers can wait to terminate the cover crop, the more residue they will have available for the cash crop in the field."

One of the most important

aspects of utilizing cover crop benefits is maximizing biomass for the following crop. Soil fertility and pH, seed quality and stand establishment are some of the major factors playing into biomass maximization.

Underground residues and root biomass are advantageous, but the surface layer is most important. That layer can help cushion rainfall to minimize runoff, shield the soil from the sun and will continue to provide benefits well into the growing season.

Heavy cover crops generally create cooler soil temperatures. While this is good for sun-

baked summer days, it may present a problem for spring planting soil temperatures.

Waiting for soil temperatures to warm up beneath the soil cover may be hard to do, but worth the wait. Delaney said it is always better to determine the optimum kill time using the growth stage and not the calendar date. There will be some variability among cover crops, but generally biomass is maximized by full bloom.

Determining the right time to terminate can be difficult, but Delaney said working ahead to give the cover crop time to die down is a move that will prove beneficial.

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# SEVERAL BRANDS OF TUNA VOLUNTARILY RECALLED

The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Consumer Food Safety Inspectors continue to conduct recall effectiveness checks on several brands of tuna due to process deviations that occurred in a co-packaging facility.

On March 16, Bumble Bee Foods LLC announced it was voluntarily recalling the following products of Bumble Bee and Chunk Light tuna:

UPC 8660000020 – 5 oz. Bumble Bee Chunk Light Tuna in Water with Best By dates of 02/10/2019, 02/16/2019, 02/17/2019, 02/18/2019, 02/22/2019, 02/23/2019, and 02/25/2019.

UPC 8660000021 – 5 oz. Bumble Bee Chunk Light Tuna in Oil with Best By date of 02/23/2019.

UPC 8660000736 – 4 pack of 5 oz. Bumble Bee Chunk Light Tuna in Water with Best By dates of 02/09/2019, 02/10/2019, 02/22/2019 and 02/29/2019.

On March 17, Tri-Union Seafoods LLC issued its precautionary, voluntary recall on select Chicken of the Sea 5 oz. canned Chunk Light Tuna in Oil and Chicken of the Sea 5 oz. canned Chunk Light Tuna in Water.

The deviations were part of a sterilization process and could result in contamination by spoilage organisms or pathogens, which could lead to life-threatening illness if consumed. It is important to note that there have been no reports of illness associated with these products to date.


The recall is being initiated out of an abundance of caution due to the possible under-processing of the affected products discovered by the co-packer during its routine quality audit.

Consumers are advised to throw away the recalled product.

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# FIVE HONORED BY ALABAMA AGRICULTURAL HALL OF HONOR

Five honorees were recognized at the 2016 Alabama Agricultural Hall of Honor banquet in February. The honorees, who were chosen by a vote of Auburn University's Ag Alumni Association members, include three new Hall of Honor inductees and two Pioneer Award recipients. Pioneer Awards recipients are recognized posthumously.

This year's Hall of Honor inductees are Jim Cravey of Shalimar, Florida, recipient in the agribusiness sector; Wayne Thames of Evergreen, production-sector honoree and Stanley Wilson of Auburn, education/government inductee.

Pioneer Awards were presented to the families of the late Walter "Sonny" Corcoran of Eufaula and Ralph Harris of Auburn.

Cravey, a Florida native, has held various leadership positions with the Alabama Farmers Federation during his 34 years there, retiring in 2004 as Commodity Department senior director and

Dairy Division director. He temporarily returned to the workforce in 2013 to serve as interim executive director of the Alabama Peanut Producers Association. He now operates a farm and hunting lodge in Covington County with his brother, Albert.

Thames, a Conecuh County cattle farmer and a member of the Alabama Livestock Hall of Fame, is a past president of the Alabama Cattlemen's Association. Thames also served on the Alabama Agricultural Development Authority and USDA's Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board.

Wilson was assistant dean of Auburn University's College of Agriculture and associate director of the Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station from 1975 to 1980, when he was named the university's vice president for agriculture, home economics and veterinary medicine. He held that position until 1985. The Andalusia native was also a cattleman who, on retiring from that operation in 2001,

donated his Angus herd and all his farming equipment to the College of Agriculture's Beef Teaching Unit. The unit was subsequently named in his honor.

Pioneer Award honoree Harris spent more than 40 years as a faculty member and then department head in Auburn's Department of Animal Sciences, where he taught animal nutrition and was a favorite among students. A member of the Alabama Livestock Hall of Fame, Harris was a native of Winfield.

Corcoran was a Barbour County farmer who played a key role in the implementation of the Boll Weevil Eradication Program in Alabama. He held leadership roles in numerous organizations, including the Alabama Farmers Federation, the Alabama Peanut Producers Association and the National Cotton Council.

The Agricultural Alumni Association established the Hall of Honor in 1984.

# Recipe of the Month

Strawberries are cultivated worldwide for its fruit. Bright red and sweet, strawberries are consumed fresh, used as ingredients in everything from preserves to ice cream, or can be frozen to enjoy later. Below is a recipe from Kraft, which we found on [www.kraftrecipes.com](http://www.kraftrecipes.com), that takes full advantage of the sweetness of strawberries.

## Glazed Strawberry Tart

**Ingredients:**

- 1-1/3 cups flour
- 1/3 cup packed brown sugar
- 2/3 cup cold butter, cut up
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar, divided
- 1 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 package (3 ounce) Jell-O Strawberry flavor gelatin
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 package (8 ounce) Philadelphia cream cheese, softened
- 1 tablespoon orange zest
- 1 cup thawed Cool Whip whipped topping
- 2 cups fresh strawberries, thinly sliced



Heat oven 350 degrees Fahrenheit.

Mix flour and brown sugar in medium bowl until blended. Cut in butter with pastry blender or 2 knives until mixture resembles coarse crumbles; knead with hands to form ball. Press onto bottom and up side of 10-inch tart pan with removable bottom. Bake 15 minutes or until golden brown; cool completely.

Meanwhile, bring 1/2 cup granulated sugar, cornstarch, dry gelatin mix and water to boil in saucepan, stirring occasionally; cook and stir 2 minutes. Cool 20 minutes.

Beat cream cheese, remaining granulated sugar and zest in large bowl with mixed until blended. Whisk in Cool Whip; spread onto bottom of crust. Top with berries and gelatin glaze. Refrigerate 3 hours or until chilled. Run knife around tart to loosen from rim of pan; remove rim.

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
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
