GMO Labeling Standard A Win for Farmers and Consumers

On July 14, 2016, the U.S. House of Representatives passed S. 764 by a vote of 306-117 creating a national labeling standard for food products containing genetically modified organisms (GMOs). The bill will now go to the President, where he is expected to sign it into law.

I want to personally thank the Alabama Farmers Federation and the American Farm Bureau for their coordinated efforts in ushering S. 764 to final passage.

The debate concerning GMO labeling is far from over, but at least now there will be

a federal standard in place rather than each state declaring their own standards. Although this bill may not be perfect, it provides a national standard that we desperately need.

This bill institutes a national mandatory labeling standard for foods that contain genetically engineered crops, with several options for how food manufacturers can label their products. They can use plain language on the package, a website URL, phone number or QR code that leads to disclosure about GMO content, or a symbol that would be created by the USDA after a two-year process.

In addition to efforts by the Alabama Farmers Federation, the Alabama congressional delegation is due recognition. I was pleased to see our congressional delegation standing up for the consumer, as well as the farmer. This bill not only provides more information in the marketplace, but also reaffirms the safety of genetically modified products. Science has proven again and again that genetic improvements allow farmers to produce the safest food possible for the consumer.


COST SHARE PROGRAMS AVAILABLE FOR ORGANIC FARMERS

Growers and handlers of organic agricultural products now can recover part of the cost of their USDA certification. The Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries (ADAI) will be allocated \$23,072 to reimburse producers and handlers who either obtain or renew their organic certification in the fiscal year that ends September 30, 2016. The reimbursement covers 75 percent of certification costs, up to a maximum of \$750.

The Organic Certification Cost Share Programs (OCCSP) reimburse eligible organic crop and livestock producers for a portion of their organic certification costs. The OCCSP consists of the following two programs authorized by separate pieces of legislation: the National Organic Certification Cost Share Program (NOCCSP) authorized by the Agriculture Act of 2014, commonly known as the Farm Bill, and the Agricultural Management Assistance (AMA) Organic Certification Cost Share Program authorized by the Federal Crop Insurance Act of 2001.

“Organic producers are encouraged to participate and we hope that the program will help them recoup some of the expenses associated with becoming a USDA certified organic operation,” said John McMillan, commissioner of Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries.

The ADAI will administer this non-competitive grant program by processing



applications for cost share funds, and USDA will reimburse them. USDA distributes funds on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted. Organic operators typically submit a one-page application form, a W-9 Tax Form, proof of certification, an itemized invoice of certification expenses, and proof of E-Verify to ADAI. The ADAI reviews the application and then may reimburse the operator for 75 percent of the cost of certification, up to a maximum of \$750 per category of certification per year.

All farmers, ranchers and handlers who have received organic certification or a renewal of certification from an accredited certifying agent between October 1, 2015 and September 30, 2016 are eligible to participate. Farms transitioning to organic production are not eligible. Most certification-related costs are eligible for reimbursement. Organic producers and handlers may be reimbursed for expenses paid for first-time organic certifications, as well as renewals of certification.

Eligible costs include the following: application

fees, inspection costs, travel or per diem for inspectors, user fees, sales assessments and postage. Ineligible costs include the following: equipment, materials, supplies, late fees and inspections for transitional certifications or due to violations of NOP regulations. The OCCSP reduces the cost of organic certification in accordance with the Agricultural Marketing Service's aim to strengthen market support for U.S. agriculture.

2. Ads should be typed or printed. Those ads that are not legible will not be published.
3. Ads must be limited to 20 words. This does not include name, address or phone number.
4. Ads must include name, address, city, zip code, area code/phone number and county, no "Farm Names or Work Names/Addresses." Only two phone numbers will be listed. Due to the number of character spaces required for most E-mail addresses, an advertiser must select either a resident address or an E-mail address. Both cannot be printed.
5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.
6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.
7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. The e-mail address is afcb@agi.alabama.gov and the fax number is 334/240-7169.
9. Ads which are to be repeated must be submitted for each issue.





SCAM WARNING ON OVER-THE-PHONE SALES

Alabama agricultural officials are warning residents of an ongoing over-the-phone chemical sales scam targeting farmers.

These telemarketers are attempting to sell a pesticide product. In one reported case to the Alabama Farmers and Consumers Bulletin, while the product being sold is a real pesticide, the telemarketer is charging much more than what it would sell for in a retail setting, and is claiming the product will last for several years, which is not accurate. Another Bulletin subscriber has reported receiving these telemarketing calls for several years, the latest of which occurred in late July.

According to Tony Cofer, Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Pesticide Management director, farmers should keep the following points in mind when being solicited:

- Always buy products from reputable stores or suppliers and avoid deals or offers that seem “too good to be true.”

- Ensure the products have the proper labels with complete instructions in English. This is a legal requirement and one that guarantees the product is authentic.

- Never buy pesticides from anyone who refuses to give a receipt naming the trademark of the products and the quantity purchased.



NITRATE POISONING PLAGUES THE SOUTH

Nitrate poisoning in cattle is a growing threat across Southeastern states battling drought. An animal scientist with the Alabama Cooperative Extension System, Kim Mullenix, says drought is increasing the chance for livestock forages to develop elevated nitrate levels.

Mullenix says that nitrates can accumulate in forages when plants are stressed by low soil moisture, high temperatures or low humidity.

“Producers should check their forages’ nitrate levels,” says Mullenix. “Nitrates can build up to toxic levels in bermudagrass or summer annual grasses when nitrogen has been applied and drought conditions limit the forage’s regrowth.”

Some commonly grown forage crops in Alabama that are known for their potential for accumulation of toxic levels of nitrates are sorghum, corn, sudangrass, sorghum-sudan hybrids, soybeans, fescue, pearl millet and bermudagrass.

Mullenix says that forages and feeds with high nitrate levels can poison cattle and other livestock.

“Cattle may exhibit labored breathing, muscle tremors and a staggering gait,” she says. “Nitrate toxicity usually results in death within a short period of time, but if prompt action is taken, death can be prevented.”

Mullenix says livestock producers should have forages’ nitrate levels tested.

“Nitrate levels can be determined through our Extension Feed and Forage Testing Program. Extension animal science agents can advise producers on how to take a good sample.”

Sweet and Sour Green Beans

Ingredients:

- ½ package of bacon (6 or 7 slices)
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- ½ onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 32 ounces frozen or fresh French-cut green beans (or other green beans)
- Salt and pepper to taste

Cut bacon into one inch segments. Place bacon and onions in skillet. Cook over medium heat until browned, stirring often. Remove to plate. Add beans to bacon grease and continue cooking over medium heat until they have reached desired tenderness. Add vinegar and sugar. Stir. Return bacon and onions to pan and let simmer a few minutes, stirring often. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve warm. Freezes well. Yields: 4-6 servings.
