### Continuing to Prepare for Avian Influenza

On Thursday, January 14th the Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries hosted an Avian Influenza Communicators Response workshop with presentations from State Veterinarian Dr. Tony Frazier, Director of Emergency Programs Ben Mullins and Communications Director Amy Belcher. The workshop brought together communications staff members from several state agencies, agricultural groups and organizations to enhance working relationships. The following day, the first case of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in 2016 was detected in Indiana.

spring 2015 was the worst animal disease outbreak in U.S. history. Long before the first cases were diagnosed in 2015, the staff at the Department of Agriculture and Industries had a HPAI surveillance testing program in place and had been preparing their response in case of a detection in Alabama.

The purpose of the Avian Influenza Communicators Response workshop was three-fold. First, to provide each attendee a clear understanding of avian influenza, how it is spread and where the concentration of poultry is in Alabama. Second, to explain what the department's emergency response would be and how resources would be put in place to address a case of avian influenza should it ever occur in Alabama. Lastly, communicators were asked to assist the department in providing accurate information

## FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR FERAL SWINE MANAGEMENT

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist Ben Malone announced that producers interested in Alabama's Wild Pig Damage Management Program should apply by February 19. NRCS Alabama will be offering financial assistance to eligible landowners through 2016's funding under the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

Feral swine have been sighted in most of the 67 counties in Alabama and can reproduce at an alarming rate. Wild pig rooting can damage native plant communities that provide habitat and food sources for native wildlife species. In addition, they degrade water quality and pose a serious disease threat to livestock and humans.

Alabama landowners in 18 counties will have an opportunity to apply for financial assistance through EQIP to monitor and manage feral swine on their property.

Applications will be accepted through February 19 in the following counties: Autauga, Baldwin, Cherokee, Coffee, Colbert, Dale, Dallas, Elmore, Etowah, Fayette, Geneva, Henry, Lamar, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Macon and Mobile.

Interested producers should visit their nearest USDA Service Center to determine eligibility. Contact your local NRCS or Farm Service Agency office to begin this

process. As with all NRCS programs, applications are accepted on a continuing basis; however, selection for funding is completed through our current batching period closing February 19.

7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. # AUBURN UNIVERSITY BEGINS TO OFFER FOOD SCIENCE DEGREE

Auburn University’s College of Agriculture’s food science program will get a major boost this fall when it changes from an option in poultry science to a full-fledged bachelor of science degree.

The new interdisciplinary degree program, approved by Auburn’s Board of Trustees last summer and by the Alabama Commission on Higher Education in December, will be administered by the Department of Poultry Science.

“Historically, students have not recognized food science as a scientific field of study or as a career option,” said Auburn Food Science Professor Leonard Bell. “Hopefully, the availability of this new program will inform teachers, guidance counselors, parents and students of the opportunities we have to offer through the B.S. in food science.”

Undergraduate enrollment in the current food science option has experienced growth in recent years as global issues related to food safety have resulted in increased employment and research opportunities. The new degree will address strategic areas of food manufacturing and production while also serving

as an essential resource of food-related initiatives on campus, such as food safety and detection, the Food Systems Institute and health sciences.

Food is a universal requirement, and the industry providing that food needs competent food science professionals, Bell said.

“Consumers expect many things from their food, including health, safety, enjoyment and stability,” he said. “These attributes require understanding the science behind the ingredients, how they interact during processing and storage, potential sources of contamination, methods of preventing contamination and issues associated with quality perception.

“In other words, we need to understand the biology, chemistry and physics of the food, and the B.S. degree in food science will prepare students to address these needs.”

Food science is about more than simply cooking, and it differs from nutrition, Bell said.

“Many students are unaware that the food science program is heavily science-based,” Bell said. “It begins with foundations in chemistry, biology and physics, and

then scientific concepts are applied to food products through courses like food chemistry, food microbiology, food engineering, sensory evaluation and food product development.

“Students interested in science that has practical and meaningful applications should seriously consider food science as a field of study.”

Programs such as Auburn’s B.S. in food science are desperately needed, Bell said, to help meet two major challenges facing the food system — feeding the growing global population and sustainability.

“Increasing agricultural production alone will not feed the world’s population,” Bell said. “Postharvest food loss, food waste and consumer fears of technological advances must be addressed. Processing perishable commodities into stable food products is an important function of food science.”

Utilizing resources more efficiently and reducing waste during the production and processing of food materials also are needed, he said.

## AUBURN'S WEAVER WINS FOR COTTON GENETICS RESEARCH

Auburn University plant breeder David Weaver was presented the U.S. cotton industry's 2015 Cotton Genetics Research Award on January 7.

Weaver, a professor in the Department of Crop, Soil and Environmental Sciences, has dedicated his career to cotton and soybean breeding and genetics research, and his accomplishments have significantly enhanced the nation's agriculture. Our Spotlight Employee of the Month is Jennifer Fitzgerald. Jennifer has worked for the Department of Agriculture and Industries for five years now.

Jennifer is an inspector for the Shipping Point Inspection Division and is based at their field office in Headland. Her main responsibility is to inspect and grade farmers' stock peanuts and mill stock peanuts. Peanuts are graded to establish the quality and value of the product. A

majority of Jennifer's inspections take place in Headland at buying points and peanut plants. After grading, peanuts can move on to the shelling process. The busiest time of year is during peanut harvest, which typically ranges from late August through November. During harvest, peanut plants operate around the clock and an inspector must be present at all times while the peanuts are being packed.

Jennifer also tests peanuts for the presence of aflatoxin in the Shipping Point lab located in Dothan. All lots of shelled peanuts destined for human consumption must be tested for the presence of aflatoxin because of the effects it could have on consumers' health.

Jennifer says that since she is not an Alabama native, she finds it rewarding to be part of an industry that is so vital to our state. In fact, approximately half the peanuts grown in the United States are grown within a 100-mile radius of Dothan. Jennifer really enjoys the people she works with and appreciates how everyone works together as a team.

Jennifer and her husband, Matthew, have an active 3-year-old son named J.R. who brings them much joy!

## WHY PLANT A COVER CROP?

For years, farmers have been looking for ways to improve soil quality, increase productivity and build erosion control. Cover crops are widely used to benefit the upcoming crop, as well as improve the soil.

Alabama Cooperative Extension Specialist Dennis Delaney said, "Cover crops do several things. They help scavenge soil nutrients lost through leaching and are able to slowly release nutrients to the following cash crop throughout the growing season."

Selecting the right cover crops can improve yields, soil and water conservation and quality, and producer profitability.

Many cover crops perform well in Alabama cropping systems. In order to choose the crop best suited for your system, consider the time frame between cash crops and what the crop needs to provide.

Delaney said first and foremost it is important to determine which cash crop will follow the cover crop.

For Nitrogen: Plant a legume cover crop. Some cereals, especially rye, are good at scavenging unused nitrogen from a previous crop. Buckwheat, mustards, radish and rye can scavenge



unused phosphorous and potassium from deep in the soil and move it closer to the surface.

**Weed Control:** Covers that produce a lot of biomass can help. Rye, black oat, sorghum-sudangrass, sunn hemp, iron clay cowpea, radish and buckwheat can smother weed seedlings. Some of these produce chemicals that can affect crop germination and growth.

**Break up Soil Compaction:** Crops with deep taproots, like tillage radish or canola, can break through a compacted layer.

**Nematode Suppression/Beneficial Insects:** Certain varieties of some cover crops, like lupin, sunn hemp, velvet bean, sorghum-sudangrass, black oats and some brassicas, repel and starve pest nematodes and keep them in check. Others, like hairy vetch, lupin, sunflower and buckwheat, attract beneficial insects that pollinate crops and eat pests.

to the public in the case of an HPAI outbreak.

Following the detection of HPAI in Indiana, the Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries John McMillan, said, "I want to assure all Alabama citizens that our department staff, specifically, our State Veterinarian Dr. Tony Frazier, is in constant contact with USDA and our HPAI Preparedness and Response Plan is in place. Every flock of chickens in Alabama is tested for avian influenza before it is processed for human consumption."

A critical step in preventing HPAI in Alabama is consistent

sound biosecurity practices of commercial poultry farmers, as well as small urban families with a few backyard chickens. Please refer to the Keep Poultry Diseases "Cooped Up" biosecurity guidelines on page 6 for steps that need to be followed EVERY day and report any suspicious signs or symptoms in your birds immediately.

## LEAN BEEF GOOD FOR YOUR DIET

The 2015 Dietary Guidelines for Americans reaffirms the role of lean beef in a healthy diet.

The guidelines, which are released by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Department of Agriculture every five years, mirror the 2010 edition on the USDA's recommendations for lean beef.

Thirty-eight cuts of beef now meet government guidelines for lean, including some of America's favorite cuts like sirloin steak and 95 percent lean ground beef.

Dr. Richard Thorpe, a physician and cattle producer, said, "As a physician, I see an opportunity to improve the health of Americans in all age categories by choosing nutrient-rich protein foods, like lean beef, more often and by pairing them with more vegetables, fruits and whole grains."

### Hamburger Fonfon with Comté

#### Ingredients:

2 lbs. ground beef chuck (all natural, such as Aspen Ridge, Creekstone Farms or Meyer Ranch)

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Olive oil

4 slices Comté cheese

4 thick slices red onion

4 sesame seed hamburger buns

1 large ripe tomato, sliced

1 head of romaine lettuce (inner leaves)

12 cornichons

1 cup Fonfon Dijonnaise (recipe to the right)

4 tablespoons ketchup

#### Fonfon Dijonnaise:

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

1 egg yolk

¾ cup olive oil

1 teaspoon Champagne vinegar

Kosher salt

Freshly ground white peppercorns (finely ground)

Dash of hot sauce

Prepare a hot grill. Divide ground chuck into four equal, 8-ounce patties, being careful not to overwork the meat (which will result in a dense burger). Place patties on a plate, season generously with salt and pepper and brush with olive oil. Place burger patties on the grill over moderately high heat until slightly browned on the bottom, about 4 minutes. Flip the burgers, place the Comté on top and grill for 4 minutes longer, until the cheese is slightly melted and the burgers are medium-rare.

Place red onion slices on grill and cook until lightly charred on both sides. Place buns, cut sides down, on grill and toast. Place burgers on toasted buns and top with grilled red onion slices, sliced tomato, romaine leaves, cornichons, Fonfon Dijonnaise and ketchup. Serve immediately.

#### For the Fonfon Dijonnaise:

In a mixing bowl, whisk together the mustard and egg yolk until slightly thickened. Slowly add in the olive oil while continuing to whisk. Once all of the oil is combined with the egg and mustard, whisk in the Champagne vinegar, salt, pepper and hot sauce. Taste to adjust and serve.
