A Look at How the Department Protects and Serves Alabama Farmers and Consumers



Connecting Farmers with Consumers

Last month at the meeting of the Board of Agriculture and Industries, Commissioner John McMillian presented a resolution proclaiming the week of August 7-13, 2016, as Farmers Market Week in Alabama. The interest in consuming locally grown food continues to grow throughout

the United States and here in Alabama. This local food movement directly connects consumers with how, where and by whom their food is grown.

According to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), the number of farmers markets nationwide has increased by 93.3 percent between 2006 and 2014. In Alabama, the number of markets has increased from 17 markets in 1999 to 164 markets today. Our 164 farmers markets generate approximately \$30 million in annual sales for more than 954 farmers.

Farmers markets are an important tool for the farmer and valuable resource for the consumer. These markets provide the farmer an opportunity to meet consumer demand for a variety of affordable, convenient, and

ALABAMA'S BEST CATFISH RESTAURANT

Amy Chandler, owner of The Old Barn Restaurant in Goshen, has a secret recipe for her Southern-style catfish. That special blend of seasoning and breading earned her high marks from judges who dubbed her establishment Bama's Best Catfish Restaurant.

In the inaugural contest sponsored by Alabama Catfish Producers, judges enjoyed the broiled and blackened catfish Chandler served. But it was her fried catfish filets that nudged her into first place, said judges who visited the restaurant in early August.

"August was National Catfish Month, and there was no better way to celebrate than announcing Bama's Best Catfish Restaurant," said Dallas County catfish farmer Will Pearce, Alabama Catfish Producers chairman who accompanied the judges. "We appreciate Amy and all the restaurant owners across the state who select U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish for their customers."

The Old Barn Restaurant was among four finalists chosen from nearly 150 customer nominations. Other finalists, who received an engraved plaque from the Alabama Catfish Producers, were David's Catfish House in Andalusia, owned by Bill Spurlin; The Green Leaf Grill of Mentone, owned by Jimmy Rogers; and Pat's Country Cuisine in Centre, owned by Pat and Ron Jackson.

Chandler, 38, and her

husband, Scottie, opened The Old Barn Restaurant 11 years ago intending it to be a hunting lodge. After installing a commercial kitchen in what was once an old barn, they decided to try the restaurant business. They've enjoyed success in other contests, too. Last year, The Old Barn Restaurant won Alabama's Best Steak Restaurant.

"We are so honored and excited to win," said Amy Chandler, whose enthusiasm and attention to detail didn't go unnoticed by the judges. "We put our heart and soul into everything we do. We won't serve anything that isn't the very best we can make it."

The only requirement for a restaurant's nomination in the contest was that it serves U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish. Judges for the event were Alabama Commissioner of Agriculture and Industries John McMillan, WSFA-TV news anchor Judd

Davis and Alabama Farmers Cooperative's Jim Allen.

"Judges taste-tasted catfish at the top four restaurants, and they had a hard decision," Pearce said. "We want all of the restaurant owners in Alabama who serve what we grow to know we appreciate them."

As the winner, The Old Barn Restaurant received a championship plaque and \$250. Chandler told judges that serving anything other than U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish was not an option.

"We tried catfish from several different suppliers when we first opened, but we chose Kelley Foods of Alabama because its fish tasted the best," Chandler said. "There was never any doubt our catfish had to be grown in America. There's a difference in how it tastes, and we know we're

5. Only paid subscribers are permitted to advertise in the Bulletin.
6. Paid subscribers can submit more than one advertisement per category per month but each advertisement is still limited to 20 words.
7. Ads for the classified section will not be accepted from dealers, merchants or commercial establishments.
8. Ads received by fax or e-mail must be received by 5 p.m. on the 10th day of the month and ads received by regular mail must be postmarked by 5 p.m. on the 12th day of the month in order to appear in the following month's issue. 

Selling such a large number of cattle at one time can raise concerns about the tax consequences from these sales. Producers are often looking for ways to postpone or avoid these consequences. Ken Kelly, an Alabama Extension farm and agribusiness management agent, says that there are two tax options for producers to address this situation.

“Producers whose main business is farming and who use a cash accounting system may choose to delay payment of capital gains on excess sales of livestock for one calendar year,” says Kelly. “This allows producers to distribute the taxes out and avoid abnormally large tax burdens in a year.”

To be eligible for this postponement the county must receive a federal disaster designation from the producers.

Kelly adds producers can be

eligible for this postponement even if they sell their livestock before the declaration. The weather condition that caused the sale must be the same as the weather that caused the federal disaster designation.

“Producers can only postpone the income that is above what their normal sales are,” says Kelly. “They cannot postpone the tax burden associated with the normal sale of livestock.”

Another option allows producers to postpone capital gains when they intend to replace the sold livestock at a later time. This is available only to those whose principal business is farming. However, producers don’t have to be in a federal disaster area or be on a cash accounting system to be eligible.

Kevin Burkett, who is on Alabama Extension’s Farm and

Agribusiness Management team, says there is a time limit to replace the livestock sold.

“Producers have two years to purchase breeding livestock to replace livestock sold above normal levels during times of weather stress. Producers have four years if the area is a federal disaster area,” says Burkett.

“Those who pay more for their replacement animals than they sold their originals for can use the overage as their tax basis for the following year,” says Kelly. “Producers who pay less for their replacement animals than they sold their originals for will be responsible for paying taxes on the difference.”

Producers should check with their tax/accounting professional to see if these options are relevant to their operation.

DROUGHT DISASTER DECLARED

As of August 19, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) expanded the Alabama counties impacted by drought. The following Alabama counties are designated as primary natural disaster areas caused by recent drought: Blount, Calhoun, Chambers, Cherokee, Cleburne, DeKalb, Etowah, Franklin, Jackson, Jefferson, Lamar, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marion, Marshall, Morgan, Randolph and St. Clair. Alabama counties contiguous to those designated as primary disaster are Bibb,

Clay, Colbert, Cullman, Fayetteville, Lauderdale, Lee, Pickens, Shelby, Talladega, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa, Walker and Winston.

Farmers located in both primary and contiguous counties are potentially eligible for emergency loans offered by USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA). Producers have eight (8) months from the date of the declaration to apply for emergency loans to help cover part of their loss. FSA will consider each loan application

on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. Additional information is available online at <http://disaster.fsa.usda.gov>.

Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Commissioner John McMillan encourages producers impacted by drought in the primary and contiguous counties to contact their local USDA-FSA office to gain additional details and eligibility criteria regarding emergency loans.

Low-Fat Crispy Chicken

Ingredients:

1½ lbs. skinless, boneless chicken breast
Salt and pepper to taste
1 cup low-fat buttermilk

¾ cup flour
¼ teaspoon paprika, or to taste
Red pepper flakes, if desired
1 large egg, beaten with fork
¾ cup Panko breadcrumbs
Butter-flavored cooking spray


Trim the chicken of the fat, wash and then pat dry. Cover with plastic wrap or waxed paper; pound to cutlet-sized thickness (¼ inch). Lightly season with salt and pepper. Soak in buttermilk.

In paper or plastic bag, mix flour with salt, pepper and paprika. Add a shake of red pepper flakes, if desired.

Remove chicken from buttermilk; drain milk but chicken should still be very moist.

Place chicken in bag with seasoned flour. Shake until chicken is well coated. Dip floured chicken in egg, then Panko breadcrumbs. Set chicken aside on plate to dry slightly.

Heat a large nonstick frying



pan; coat with cooking spray. When pan is at medium heat and cooking spray sizzles, add chicken. When first side is dark golden brown, remove the chicken. Spray pan again. When spray is hot, return chicken to cook the second side until completely cooked through.



CONSERVATION LEADERS INDUCTED TO NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

Two Alabama conservation leaders have received national recognition. Dr. Richard Guthrie, of Bullock County, and Barnett King, of Crenshaw County, were officially inducted into the Southeast Region National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) Hall of Fame in August. Alabama's delegate to NACD and board member Dr. Carol Knight presented the honors.

"The Alabama Association of Conservation Districts (AACD) is fortunate to have many distinguished members, but these two stood out to be deserving of this honor this year. Both have demonstrated a life-long commitment to the wise use of natural resources, conservation education and promoting agriculture in our state," said Knight.

From his childhood raised on a cattle farm, through his pursuit of education and a career, to today, Guthrie has devoted his life to conservation. With a doctorate in soil science, Guthrie retired from a

20-year career as an NRCS soil scientist and later led Auburn University's College of Agriculture as dean. He sat for five years on the Soil & Water Conservation Committee and currently chairs the Bullock County Conservation District.

At age 90, King continues 31 years of active service as a Crenshaw County Conservation District supervisor, and a life-long commitment, professionally and personally, to conservation. King served as president of

the Alabama Association of Conservation Districts and the Soil & Water Conservation Committee, and was a charter member of TREASURE Forest. In 2002, he was named National Tree Farmer of the Year. Today, King and his wife manage their farm and an 87-acre nature trail and outdoor classroom for conservation education activities.

Our Spotlight Employee of the Month is Ray Latham. He has worked for the Department of Agriculture and Industries for 37 years.

Ray is a Consumer Food Safety Inspector and works in the field. His primary responsibilities include

going to grocery stores or other retail locations that sell food products, such as convenience stores and food distribution warehouses, to check for out-of-date products or any potentially hazardous foods. Foods that he inspects include dairy products, eggs, meat, other refrigerated products, baby food, etc. While in the stores, he checks for compliance with temperature requirements of potentially hazardous foods, rodent or insect issues and proper storage practices. For example, store owners are not allowed to store cleaning products above food items in case of leakage. Another important responsibility Ray carries out is, when FDA issues a recall, he and other Consumer Food Safety Inspectors conduct recall effectiveness checks to ensure that the products are no longer available for human consumption. Ray also collects products for testing in the Food and Drug laboratory and responds to consumer complaints.

Ray’s favorite part of his job is being part of the consumer protection process. He also enjoys meeting new people and helping store owners come into compliance with proper regulations.

Ray has been married for 43 years to his wife, Deborah. They have a son Brian, and a daughter, Heather. They also have three grandchildren: Brianna (9), Latham (8) and Beckham (4).
